

CAMPBELL HERE TO ADDRESS ALUMNI

Dr. P. L. Campbell, president of the University of Oregon, arrived in Medford this afternoon to address the former students of the University at their banquet scheduled for six o'clock, this evening in the Hotel Holland. The subject of President Campbell's toast will be the University, its Present Work and its Aspirations.

President Campbell although an Oregonian, by birth, received his education at Harvard University. For a number of years he was president of the Monmouth Normal school. In the last election when the question of re-establishing the Ashland and Weston Normal schools was before the people, President Campbell entered heartily into the campaign in their behalf, holding that there was a great need for well trained grammar school teachers in the schools of the state.

Since 1903 Mr. Campbell has been president of the University of Oregon. Under his management the University has grown from an institution with an enrollment of but a few hundred to its present size, which in all of its departments has a total registration of fourteen or fifteen hundred. Not only has the University grown in point of numbers but it also has advanced its standards during recent years. Its grade of work is now strictly standardized and is exactly similar to that of the leading state universities of the country.

W. I. Vawter of the class of 1886 will serve as toastmaster. The program of toasts is as follows: President P. L. Campbell, "The University, its Present Work and its Aspirations"; Dr. George Rebec, "The University and the Wider Service"; W. H. Gore of the class of 1886, "Oregon in Nestor's Time"; Miss Ruth Merrick, "How it Looks to 1912"; Mr. A. E. Reames, E. S. Van Dyke and Felix Moore, "On the Carpet." It is expected that a few others will be called upon for informal talks.

NEW STAR MAIL ROUTE ORDERED

Commencing today a new star mail route between Derby and Prospect will be in operation which will serve the residents of upper Rogue River with a daily mail service. Heretofore Prospect has been served with mail three times a week from Eagle Point by way of Trail.

One hundred-sixty-five (165) nurses have been registered to date under the waiver.

Wednesday, August 28, the state association of nurses gave a reception at the Nurses Club, 374 Third street for Mrs. Osborne the president of the state board. The reception was marked by the usual courtesies, beautiful floral decorations and light refreshments.

KANSAS CITY, Sept. 2.—Woodrow Wilson's criticism of the minimum wage feature of the progressive platform brought a sharp retort from Governor Johnson of California. Speaking at Concert Hall here the progressive vice presidential candidate said Wilson had failed to comprehend the question.

He said "I read with some surprise the speech of the democratic candidate for president in which he denounces the minimum wage scale for women. I ask you, did the tired woman who labors for a meagre wage or the employer who makes it necessary for her to toil for the unsatisfactory sum rejoice when they read the statement? It is apparent the candidate who made that utterance lacks understanding of that particular evil which we seek to remedy."
