


Jeff Never Worries About Small Details Like Money

MEAT QUESTION BEFORE COUNCIL

With a debate in connection with the management of the public market in connection with the sale of meat to enliven the proceedings, the city council held its regular monthly session Tuesday evening and dispatched considerable routine business.

The debate in regard to the public market came when Louis Heil applied for a permit to screen three booths at the market and sell meat in that place. Mr. Heil stated that Councilman Millar had promised to see that his request would be granted by the council. Mr. Millar in reply stated that he had agreed to bring the matter before the council and that he was not a "lobbyist." Following a debate of some length the matter was referred to the public market committee.

The council last evening agreed to pay the salary of Chief Hittson for the past month, although the chief has not been working owing to sickness.

The bills for the past month were allowed.

The quarterly report of the city treasurer was filed and accepted.

The liquor license of B. S. Haddell was renewed for a period of six months.

The recorder was ordered to advertise for bids for \$20,000 bridge bonds.

Bids of the Jacobsen-Bade company and the Clark & Henry Construction company for improvement bonds were accepted.

A resolution to pave Cottage street with asphalt from Main to Taylor streets was passed.
