

BULL MOOSE HOLD PRIMARY

SEATTLE, Wn., Sept. 7.—Washington progressives holding a preference primary election today for the nomination of state and county bull moose tickets. There are four candidates for governor, Sheriff Robert T. Hodge of Seattle; County Auditor Otto Case of Seattle; Former Railroad Commissioner J. C. Lawrence of Spokane, and president of the state senate, W. H. Paulhamus of Tacoma. There are contests for every state and congressional office except state treasurer, which nomination will go to Arthur S. Corey of Chehalis without a fight. The candidates receiving the highest vote in today's primaries will be nominated in state and county conventions on next Tuesday. The state laws require nominations of new parties to be made by conventions instead of direct primaries.

GRENFELL MISSIONS IN LABRADOR SUFFER FROM MISMANAGEMENT



Another cause for complaint lies entirely now by the Seamen's Institute at the hospital at Battle Harbor. Dr. St. Johns, and the work in Labrador Grenfell's time is consumed almost equally.

Bad management of the thousands of dollars donated to them annually, misappropriation of funds, the diverting of property of a charitable institution to private uses, the evasion of customs duties and the renting of their hospital ships and launches for pleasure cruises or for commercial purposes are charges made against some of the men promoting the Labrador missions of Dr. Wilfred T. Grenfell which are to be made public.

No blame attaches to Dr. Grenfell, but all is placed upon a careless method of bookkeeping and lack of systematic supervision. Several of the co-operative stores established by Dr. Grenfell to sell food and supplies to the impoverished fishermen at a fair price were compelled to shut down. The reindeer project, which was started with the idea of furnishing a better means of travel and transportation than dogs, has been bungled, according to recent reports.

ARMY OFFICERS LOSE COMMISSIONS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7.—Captain Jacques De Lafitte, 12th infantry, stationed at Monterey, Cal., and Captain Reese, of the Philippine scouts, will be dismissed from the United States army September 10, their sentences having been approved by President Taft. Lafitte was tried by court martial and found guilty of charges of scandalous conduct and irregularity in his accounts. Reese was found guilty of brutality toward enlisted men, drunkenness, etc. Both received sentences of dismissal, but Reese was to be confined at hard labor for fifteen years in addition. President Taft, however, disapproved this portion of Reese's sentence.
