BURNS VICTOR OVER ONE ROUND HOGAN

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 10.—The deep seated grudge of long standing was settled Monday when Frankie Burns of Oakland knocked out "One Round" Jack Hogan of this city in the tenth round of a lightweight battle before 8000 frenzied fight fans. The venom and hate behind every punch was so intense that force was necessary to make the belligerents take their corners, on one or two occasions after the gong had terminated the round. The contest was one of the most sanguinary ever witnessed in a local arena and the gameness of Hogan in being subjected to the grueling trip hammer face punches of his foe was marvelous. Burns took command in the third and only the expert coaching of Spider Kelly, Hogan's chief second and the gong saved Hogan from defeat. Burns tried to end matters in the fourth but Hogan rallied and assuming the aggressive and sent in hard rights and lefts until Burns' features were badly swollen. The five next rounds were savage ones, Burns boring in and Hogan gamely trying to check the Oaklander's onslaughts. In the tenth Burns met Hogan with a vicious uppercut that signaled defeat. He followed this with three crashes to the jaw that sent Hogan to the canvas. Hogan gamely struggled to his feet but he was done for. The rest was easy for Burns who planted a solid finishing blow to the chin.

LOCAL FINANCIAL SITUATION GOOD

The problem presented by the marketing of the fruit crop has been well handled by the local banks. Their financial statements, as called for by the comptroller at Washington, show in the main an increase of loans for the above purpose. All the banks show healthy reserves, which will be materially increased soon, as the returns continue to come in from crop shipments, and as deposits rise. Altogether, the local financial situation, after a somewhat protracted period of liquidation, shows a solid foundation, and a marked tendency for betterment.
