

# HANGING ONLY FOR THE POOR SAYS WARDEN

Head of San Quentin Prison Bitterly Protests Against Capital Punishment—One Murder No Remedy for Another—No Lesson to Criminals Says His Duty is to Supervise Hangings, But That It Unnerves Him for Days Afterward.

SAN QUENTIN, Cal., Sept. 10.—Unstrung by the part he must play in the hanging of several murderers at San Quentin penitentiary within the next six weeks, Warden J. E. Hoyle voiced today bitter protest against capital punishment, emphatically asserting that society has no right to take the life of any man.

**Nine to be Executed**

At intervals of one week nine men are scheduled to die at San Quentin and Folsom, California's two big penitentiaries.

"Only the poor hang," protested Warden Hoyle. "The rich most always go free. It is the law, but it is not justice.

"My duty here makes it necessary for me to supervise hangings. But when the rope is put about the doomed man's neck, I look away—I cannot stand it. I am unnerved for days afterward.

"I am against capital punishment, not from sentimental reasons, but from a sense of justice. It is only the poor devil who gets the death penalty. The rich man hires competent attorneys, who, through technicalities, save him from the gallows. It isn't fair. The poor man should have the same chance.

**Proven No Remedy**

"One murder is no remedy for another, so nothing is gained to society by killing a murderer. It's no lesson to the criminally inclined, and the records prove that it is no preventive for crime. I believe that the punishment for murder should be life imprisonment with credits for good behavior and the privilege of parole or pardon. This does not kill hope in a man. It makes him better, because he knows he has a chance. The time will come when the execution of murderers will be looked upon as a relic of barbarism."

The nine men who are condemned to die within the next six weeks are George Figueroa, Alexander Santschar, William Burke, Willie Lais (Cline), Edward Williams, Manuel Bombela, Jacob Oppenheimer, Chas. Carson and Edward Delhantie. All are murderers except Carson, who participated in a jailbreak, an offense punishable in California by death.

# NOTED BRAZILIAN MAY VISIT HERE

M. Pio Correa, minister of agriculture, Brazil, commissioned by his government to investigate forestry methods in the United States, will probably visit Medford and the Crater National forest in the near future according to advices received by M. L. Erickson, supervisor of the Crater National forest, from the bureau of forestry at Washington. The Crater National forest is one of six, to which the Brazilian official asked and received credentials in the way of letters of introduction to the forest supervisors.

Aside from the fact that such letters were issued at Washington Mr. Erickson knows nothing regarding the official's itinerary. He is expected soon, however.

# DEMAND THAT CITY ALLEYS BE CLEANED

An insistent demand is being made in the city that the city officials take steps to have the alleys throughout the city cleaned. At present a large number of alleys are in a frightful condition, being most unsanitary. Some of them not only are unsightly, but smell unto high heaven, due to a custom of filling garbage cans with refuse and leaving it there until it decays.

For some time action on the part of residents has been planned, but not until now has this sentiment crystallized. A demand will be made in the near future to have the city officials enforce sanitary regulations in the various alleys.

# DRIER BURNS; LOSS WILL EXCEED \$5000

The drier at the Lozier Canning works on the Jacksonville road burned Monday evening about 9:30 o'clock causing a loss of \$5000 of which \$1500 was covered by insurance. The origin of the fire is a mystery. The Medford fire department responded, although the drier stood without the city limits and by a liberal use of chemicals prevented spreading of the flames to a nearby packing house.

The fire will cause considerable loss to Thomas Howard and J. M. Morse who were operating the plant as they had contracted for considerable fruit and will be unable to complete a new drier in time for this year's crop.

A large crowd was attracted by the fire rushing to the scene in every manner of conveyance.

Carloads of material are beginning to arrive in the city for the Clark-Henry Construction company, who plan to start work at once in the actual paving of West Eleventh street. A paving plant mounted on flat cars is due to arrive in the near future and work will be rushed while the present weather continues in order to have it completed before rains set in in earnest.

A few short streets will be paved in addition to West Eleventh. Work on laying the curb and gutters on West Eleventh is progressing rapidly.
