**COPPER BRICK PLATED WITH GOLD COST OWNER \$10,000**

SEATTLE, Sept. 13.—A ten thousand dollar gold brick swindle perpetrated three years ago on W. R. Marlon, a wealthy resident of South Bend, Wash., who has since died, was disclosed today when a cheese shaped brick weighting 100 pounds was declared by government assay officials here to be an excellent grade of copper covered with a thick plate of gold. Marlon is believed to have bought the brick and to have later found that he had been swindled but did not complain to the officials. The purchase was made from a half blood Mexican who visited Marlon according to Mrs. Marlon.

**CUNNINGHAM COAL CLAIMS CANCELLED**

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 13.—The register of the Juncoy, Alaska, land office has placed on record the cancellation for fraud of the so-called Cunningham coal claims, thirty-two in number, upon order of the general land office at Washington.

The lands became a part of the public domain and the money, amounting to more than \$50,000, paid into the treasury by the claimants, is forfeited. It cannot be refunded, except by an act of congress.
