CHURCHMEN SUED FOR KIDNAPPING A GIRL

TACOMA, Wash., Sept. 13.—Mrs. Lizzie Magnuson, before Judge Card in the superior court will continue today to relate the details of her daughter, Marjorie Riemans, alleged kidnapping by prominent churchmen of Tacoma, in her case to recover \$40,000 damages. The defendants are Bishop Edward J. O'Dea of the Nisqually diocese, the Rev. Father George C. Van Goethem, Mother Superior Camillus and Sister Alydus, both of the Academy of the Visitation, a Catholic school of this city.

The mother alleges that in February 1911, Marjorie was persuaded to run away by these defendants, that the girl was secreted by Father Van Goethem in the home of Attorney Louis Lefebvre, later to be hurried away to Portland and San Francisco by Father Van Goethem who placed her in a Catholic institution there under an assumed name.

INDUSTRIAL WORKERS OF WORLD TO PARADE

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—Arrangements were completed today for a general parade by the Industrial Workers of the World here as a protest against the imprisonment of Joseph Ettor and Arturo Giovannitti, now in jail at Lawrence, Mass., on the charge of murder growing out of the recent textile strike.

An immense mass meeting is planned to be held in Union square, at which William D. Haywood, one of the leaders of the I. W. W. who directed the strike at Lawrence, will deliver an address.

TEACHERS INSTITUTE TO BE HELD SEPTEMBER 25TH

The Teachers' Annual Institute of Jackson and Josephine counties will be held at Ashland, Sept. 25, 26 and 27 in the new high school building. Addresses will be made by L. R. Alderman, superintendent of public instruction, Salem, J. H. Ackerman, president Oregon Normal Institute at Monmouth, Dr. A. E. Winship of Boston, Mrs. Mamie Fulkeson of Salem, and other noted instructors.

WHITE SLAVE TRAFFIC SHOWN IN MOVIES

One of the most unusual entertainments that has ever been seen in Medford will occupy the attention of theater goers on the nights of Saturday and Sunday at the Medford Theater when Professor George Samuels will show the only set of views of the famous New York production of Parsifal, together with an illustrated lecture of a tour of the world, entitled "A Trip Around the World in Ninety Minutes," and 90 slides showing the white slave traffic.

Professor Samuel is the owner of the only set of stereopticon views in the United States of the wonderful Wagnerian musical drama which was produced in the American metropolis at a cost of over \$16,000 a performance after the initial cost of production, amounting to more than \$100,000, had been put into it for its scenic environments. All of the views are colored and depict exactly the scenes from the greatest drama ever attempted in this country and carried through to a success.

The story of the drama is told in picture from the first act to the last scene, and it is accompanied by an excellent lecture by Professor Samuels.

Following the Parsifal lecture and pictures will be shown a series of pictures taken on a recent tour around the world by Professor Samuels, entitled "A Trip Around the World in Ninety Minutes," and which were gathered by him on his journeys. The start will be made from New York City, from which point, via the Louisiana, the audience is taken to Liverpool. NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—Reconciliation between General Daniel E. Sickles and his wife from whom he has been separated twenty-seven years, is believed to be in sight here today, the result of Mrs. Sickles pledging her jewelry with pawnbrokers to prevent her husband's property from being sold for debt. A judgment of \$8,066 had been obtained against Sickles, and an auction of his effects ordered.

PORTLAND TO HOLD TWO EXPOSITIONS

PORTLAND, Or., Sept. 12.—Visitors to Portland during the third week of November will find two full grown expositions in progress. One will be the Pacific Land Products Show, the other the Pacific International Dairy Show, the dates for both being November 18-23.

There will be much of interest in both shows. To the man or woman who has anything to do with dairying, the latter exhibition will be of very great value.

Biggest of Dairy Shows

This will be the biggest dairy show ever held in the Pacific Northwest and it is hoped to make it an annual event, increasing its scope each year. Already it is attracting exhibitors from a very wide extent of territory, the entry blanks asked for representing many sections of the east and middle west.

B. H. Rawl of the dairy division of the U. S. department of agriculture, has advised that Mr. Bothell of that division will probably take charge of the milk and cream department of the show. The state health office has been requested to make the chemical and bacteriological milk tests. A cooler has been provided where the milk will be kept at a temperature of 34 degrees.

Good Prizes Offered

Although there are no entrance nor entry fees, substantial prizes are offered. The whole purpose of the show is to make it of educational value to those interested in the dairy industry.

A big feature will be the exhibit and sales of fine dairy cattle. There will be pure bred and grade animals and it is thought these sales will prove attractive in view of the big demand for cattle of quality, especially those available for milking.

TURKISH REFORMS MAY AVERT WAR

LONDON, Sept. 13.—Owing to the program of reform which the Porte proposes to grant to Macedonia and other Christian provinces, less fear of war in the Balkans is felt in Constantinople today, according to a despatch to the Daily Mail here.

While these reforms do not amount to autonomy, the despatch states that assurances have been given by the Turkish government that a constitution granting equal treatment to all nationalities will be put into execution.
