The litigation against the company was begun by farmers who claimed their cattle died from the fumes of the smelter.

FORTY-SIX WARSHIPS FOR UNCLE SAM'S NAVY

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—Shipbuilders in different parts of the country are at work today on 46 new war vessels for the United States navy, according to announcement here by the naval construction bureau. The list includes six battleships, eleven torpedo boat destroyers, seven submarine tenders, one submarine tender, two sea-going naval tugs, four naval colliers and one gunboat.

ALL HAWAII SWEARED BY SUGAR TRUST GRAFT

HONOLULU, Sept. 13.—Declaring that it was hard to find a man in the islands qualified for the position of governor who was not affiliated with the sugar interests, Secretary of the Interior Walter L. Fisher expressed himself here today as favoring an amendment to the organic act of Hawaii which would permit appointing some man from the mainland as chief executive. Secretary Fisher came here to investigate charges against Governor Frear.

NO MILITANT SUFFRAGETTES WANTED IN DOMINION

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 13.—Militant English suffragettes, who recently decided to go to Canada soon as a protest against the Canadian premier's views on suffrage, will find themselves stopped by an order today in the hands of the immigration officials here. While there is a strong move for the enfranchisement of women in Canada, militant suffragettes are considered undesirable in the meaning of the immigration act.
