WAX FIGURES AT NEW YORK EXHIBIT SHOW TARIFF EVILS



The Wilson-Marshall Tariff Exhibit, a unique method of bringing before the public the argument for a revision downward, as advocated by Governor Wilson, has been opened in New York city. Almost every industry is represented, and comparisons are shown in figures. The idea of the exhibit was conceived by Mrs. Sladen, wife of Representative Sladen, of Texas, when they were in Mexico. Exhibits on a tariff revision will be opened in many of the large cities. In one part of the exhibit three wax figures show the unfulfilled promises of the Bull Moose to give the workman a full envelope by tariff reduction. The third figure is standing, life size, blowing hot air through a tube, while next to him stands a workman, tall and gaunt, with an empty dinner pail and with little pay in his envelope. On the left stands the factory owner, fat and prosperous who is getting the money. Several balloons, showing the Tobacco Trust divided, but still doing business, are presented as Mr. Taft's idea of destroying the trusts. As shown, large or small, they are still a trust. The model flat gives an idea of the tariff from a woman's viewpoint. It is furnished and the purchase price is marked on each article. The export price is also quoted, and the difference, which is paid by the American, ranges anywhere from thirty to ninety per cent.

WHITE SLAVE DEN FOUND AT CLEVELAND

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Sept. 14.—Through the story told the police here today by a seventeen year old girl who claimed to have been drugged by a woman who lured her to a house and kept her prisoner for a week, the authorities believe they have uncovered a gigantic white slavery plot which will eventually account for the twenty-three girls who have mysteriously disappeared from Cottonwood, a suburb of Cleveland, during the past three weeks. Warrants have been prepared for the arrest of 42 men and women who the police now have under surveillance. It is believed that the operations of the white slavers were carried on here to obtain victims that were immediately sent to other parts of the country.
