

### LABORITES CENSURE REPUBLICANS BUT ENDORSE NO ONE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14.—Increase in the representation of organized labor in congress is the keynote of a political program to be announced tomorrow by the American Federation of Labor in a news letter. Although President Taft is roundly scolded, the letter fails to endorse either Governor Wilson or Colonel Roosevelt.

The platforms of the three parties are set out in full. The republican platform is criticised, while corresponding praise is voiced for the democratic and progressive documents. The letter says the republicans ignored the questions and principles "of justice and human liberty" affecting organized labor. President Taft, it says, has accentuated his antagonism to correction of abuse of injunction power, while Wilson and Roosevelt are outspoken in favor of such reforms.

The bulletin also approves Samuel Gompers' administration of the affairs of the federations and calls upon all union laborers to elect municipal, county, state and congressional candidates favorable to organized labor.

### GLASS GRANTED PERMIT TO GO TO PHILIPPINES

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Sept. 14.—Superior Judge Lawlor today granted permission to Louis Glass, former vice president and general manager of the Pacific States Telegraph & Telephone company, who was charged before Lawlor with bribery to leave the state for a period of four months that he might journey to the Philippines to establish a telephone service there.

Lawlor refused recently to grant the motion of the district attorney to dismiss the Glass case, holding that the state had not exhausted all its resources. Glass was accused in connection with the Ruef-Schmitz cases here.

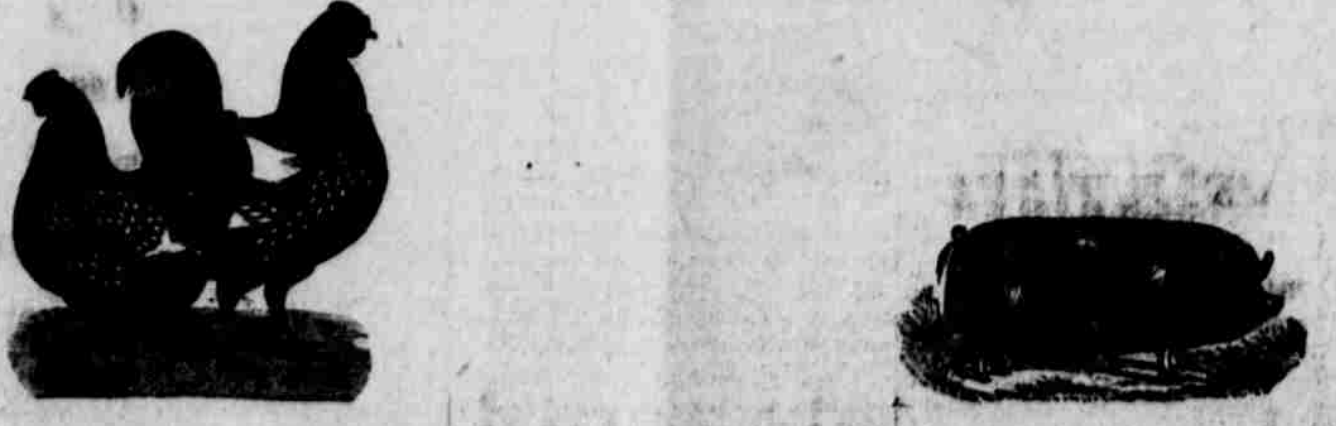
