1912 HOOD RIVER XTRA FANCY APPLE CROP IS SMALLER

HOOD RIVER, Ore., Sept. 16.—Officers of the several fruit shipping concerns of the city and valley met at the office of the Davidson Fruit company yesterday to make careful estimates of the several varieties and grades of the Hood River apple crop for this season. However, the most important feature of the meeting was to secure a careful estimate of the number of extra fancy Spitzenbergs, four tier and larger, to be marketed this year, as these are the apples that bring the high prices and are eagerly sought in the east. After a comparison of figures of the valley's apple crop that has now been signed up by the growers with the several associations, it was discovered that there would not be over 100,000 boxes of this variety and grade. This is less than one half the estimate of the earlier part of the season. The total output will aggregate 800,000 boxes.

Standard, who is 22 years of age, pleaded guilty to embezzlement. He was given ten years on each of six indictments but Judge Welborn announced that the sentences will be served concurrently.

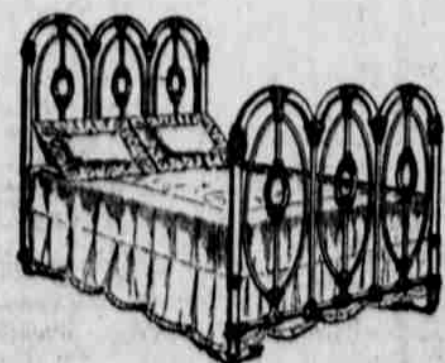

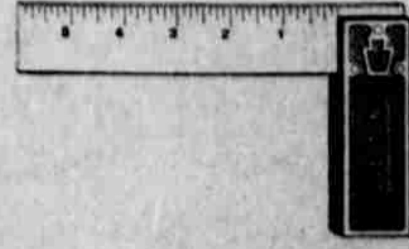
