BOSTON, Sept. 17.—Bertram Spencer, the Springfield, Mass., "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde," who killed Miss Sarah Blackstone in that city March 21, 1910, while he was on a burglarizing expedition, was electrocuted in Charlestown prison early today. Spencer walked to the chair unassisted. As the straps were being adjusted he said: "I wish to say to the world and the press that this is not nerve, but the love of God, which sustains me. Good night." Spencer, who was married and a clerk in a Springfield store, admitted he entered upon a career of burglary, "because he wanted to get pretty thing for his wife."

LAWSON AGAIN HITS WALL STREET

NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—Thomas W. Lawson of "frenzied finance" renews his war on Wall Street in an article appearing in the October number of Everybody's magazine out here today. Lawson charges that the real cause of the high cost of living is due to sure thing gambling on the stock exchange, asserting that through the exchange the people are robbed of two or three billions of dollars annually and demands that the exchanges be closed. Lawson also predicts that the next eight years will tell whether or not America is to be "covered with moss like the slime-covered ruins of Rome." The purchasing power of money, Lawson claims, has been cut in half during the last forty years.
