JAPAN CHOOSES SITE FOR FAIR BUILDING

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 18.—With a military review of 3,000 troops at the Presidio, daylight fireworks and religious ceremonies, the dedication of the site selected by the Japanese commissioners for Nippon's exhibit at the 1915 Panama Pacific exposition, was conducted here today. Japan is the first foreign nation to select a site on the grounds. An ornamental signboard characteristic of Old Japan marks the spot. The Japanese exhibit, it is estimated, will cost \$1,000,000, and after the exposition will be presented as a gift to the United States. Leaving the Fairmont Hotel, the party, including the Japanese commissioners, acting Governor Wallace, Mayor Rolph, foreign consuls and directors of the exposition, as well as about 100 other prominent citizens proceeded in automobiles to the Cliff House, where luncheon was served. The party then proceeded direct to the exposition site.

FIVE NEW CARDINALS AT NOVEMBER CONSISTORY

ROME, Italy Sept. 18.—The date of the November consistory when five new cardinals, including an American, are to be created, is expected to be announced soon by Pope Pius. It is generally believed here that Rector Kennedy, of the American college in Rome, will be one of the five.
