SUIT FILED AGAINST FATHER OF OROZCO

EL PASO, Texas, Sept. 18.—Preliminary extradition warrants against Colonel Pascual Orozco, senior, father of the rebel leader, are filed today with the local United States commissioner by the Mexican consul at El Paso. Orozco, senior, who is held with six others at Presidio, Texas, will have the charge of murder entered against him, it is said, growing out of the execution of a number of federal spies in Juarez, Mexico last June. The Mexican government has made no attempt to hold the other prisoners at the Presidio who fled to the American border following the capture of Ojinaga by the federal forces.
