ROOSEVELT REPLIES TO BRYAN'S QUERIES

DENVER, Colo., Sept. 20.—A declaration in favor of the recall of the president was made here last night by Colonel Roosevelt. He proposed if he was named president and that if he found his stew were in opposition to the people he would take the stump in defense of his policies and quit the office if he could not win the support of the electorate.

Roosevelt's declaration was in direct reply to a question addressed to him by Colonel Bryan at Pueblo recently.

"How many times may a president of the United States serve?"

In effect, his answer was when he had no longer had the people with him and could not win them around to his way of thinking.

Continuing, Roosevelt said: "As to the number of non-consecutive times a president might have, every argument in favor of the limitation of terms of the president can refer only to the consecutive terms. Any third term talk which refers to the non-consecutive terms is utter absurdity."

In answer to Bryan's other queries, which numbered five in all, Roosevelt said regarding the letter from him to E. H. Harriman, which began, "My Dear Mr. Harriman," that he had gone over that matter time after time. As to what issues in the progressive platform were not borrowed from the democratic, Roosevelt replied:

"All of them were not borrowed." The initiative and referendum, in answer to another question, Roosevelt said, were treated by the progressive platform as both state and national issues. To the question of "What is the interest of Perkins in your campaign?" Colonel Roosevelt answered that Perkins had joined the movement because he believed it offered a solution of the problems which must be solved to insure the continued welfare of the people.

MAKING SITES FOR SAN FRANCISCO FAIR

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 20.—Contract No. 1 which calls for the filling in of 71 acres of Harbor View lands, has been completed by the San Francisco Bridge company. The overflow lands that have been filled in cover that portion of the exposition site bounded by the center line of Webster street, the southerly line of Bay street, the center line of Devisquin street, the corner line of Scott street, the center line of Scott street and the southerly line of Lewis street.

In making this fill 1,400,000 cubic yards of silt was pumped from the bay on the land; in order to appreciate the vast amount of silt used in this work of filling in the overflow lands for a foundation to the exhibit palaces, which are to be erected on that portion of the fair site, engineers estimate that it would fill an area equivalent to Union Square to a height of 240 feet; which is practically as high as the Ferry tower.

SAYS PANAMA CANAL CUTS COST OF LIVING

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 20.—That at least five per cent of the present cost of living will be saved to Californians by the opening of the Panama canal was the prediction made here today by William R. Wheeler, manager of the chamber of commerce traffic bureau. He maintains that his prediction is based on expert knowledge of what will follow water competition. Railroad rates between the two coasts, he says, will be reduced from thirty-five to forty per cent, and this will result in the following decreases: Plumbing bills will be cut down by 10 per cent; look stoves will cost from \$1 to \$2 less; the price of coal will be lowered; irrigation pipe will be several dollars cheaper—in fact there will be sweeping reduction in all commodities.

JOHNSON, EXHAUSTED, CANCELS INDIANA TRIP

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Sept. 20.—Worn out by untiring efforts in the interest of the new party, Governor Hiram Johnson of California, the progressive candidate for vice president, cancelled today's Indiana program and is resting for his Ohio tour. Since leaving California several weeks ago, Governor Johnson has averaged ten speeches daily. He left Indianapolis at noon for Cincinnati.

TO SOLVE PROBLEM OF FRUIT DISTRIBUTION

SPOKANE, Sept. 20.—The fifth national apple show in Spokane this fall is expected to accomplish one thing in particular which will be of great value to the growers throughout the northwest. This will be the launching of a thoroughly organized movement to solve the problem of distribution.

To secure the result a conference of growers, city and country bankers, transportation men and business men will be held in Spokane during the apple show, November 11 to 18.

The trustees have determined to place the apple show on a permanent footing, and have named a board of governors containing representatives of every apple district in the northwest, as well as Governors Marion E. Hay of Washington, Oswald West of Oregon, James H. Hawley of Idaho and Edwin L. Norris of Montana, and the lieutenant governor of British Columbia.

CALIFORNIA OUSTED BY NATIONAL COMMITTEE

NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—California's representation on the republican national committee will be declared vacant some time today, according to a statement issued this afternoon by Chairman Charles D. Hilles, a short time before the committee was to meet. The committee-men from New Jersey, West Virginia, and North Carolina would also be ousted, Hilles said, and the resignation of those representing Oklahoma and Minnesota accepted.

SPEED KINGS OF WORLD RACE FOR GOLDEN TROPHY

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Sept. 20.—Heavy rains throughout the night left the course over which the Pabst automobile races are to be run today in a wet and slippery condition but officials said there would be no postponement. The drivers spent the morning in practice tests.

A king's ransom is represented in the trophies and cash prizes hung up by the Automobile Club of America, the American Automobile Association, the Milwaukee Automobile Dealers' Association and Col. Gustave Pabst, Milwaukee, for the four international road racing classics. The Milwaukee speed carnival is known the world over as the most richly pursued automobile contest that has ever been held. For the sum of \$50,000 barely covers the mere intrinsic value of the solid gold and silver cups and the money purses. The nearest approach to the Vanderbilt cup races at Milwaukee, in point of value of the prizes, was the last international sweepstake race on the Indianapolis speedway on Memorial day, but the total given to drivers then was only \$25,000, one-half of the amount which will be contested for in Milwaukee.
