SOUTHERN OREGON PIONEER DEAD AT HOLLAND HOME

J. E. Tyeer, one of the most widely known and generally respected of the pioneers of Southern Oregon, died at his home near Holland Wednesday morning at the ripe old age of 83 years. The funeral services will be held at Kerby, Thursday, at 2:30 p. m. The deceased had lived at Holland for fifty years, having taken up the land which had been his home ever since, half a century ago. He had always been of the rugged, sturdy type of man hood, in the best of physical condition all time, with its ravages, made serious inroads upon his strength, and for the past three months he has rapidly failed. Besides a wife, he leaves six children, 3 boys and 3 girls, Ed, Tom and Will all of whom reside in Holland, and 3 daughters, Mrs. James White and Mrs. Alek White of Holland, and Mrs. Susie Agle of Portland. One brother, O. S. Tyeer, and a sister, Mrs. T. T. Lewis, also survive him.
