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**MONGOLIANS MASSACRED BY CHINESE TROOPS**

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 23.—The Chinese expeditionary troops in Mongolia plundered and burned several monasteries and massacred 1,000 Mongolians, according to despatches received here today from Harbin. The Chinese are said to have mutilated the bodies of women and children. Prince and Princess Un-Ai escaped, but all other members of their royal family were murdered.

Burns Detective Agency of \$55,000 of the \$70,000 loot taken from a Louisville and Nashville express car by bandits in a hold-up near Pensacola, Florida, was announced here today by railroad officials.
