KID M'COY SUES BELGIUM FOR \$200,000

BRUSSELS, Sept. 23.—Suits for \$200,000 damages against the government of Belgium was filed here today by representatives of Norman Selby, known in the American prize ring as "Kid McCoy." for his alleged false imprisonment in London by British authorities, acting in behalf of Belgian officials.

McCoy's arrest followed an \$50,000 jewelry robbery in a hotel at Ostend. The pugilist was held in London for several weeks awaiting extradition to Belgium for alleged complicity in the theft. He was released by a London magistrate when it developed that the only evidence against him was that furnished by an intoxicated woman, who later retracted statements given the Belgian police.

SLIGHT DECLINES IN LIVE STOCK

PORTLAND, Sept. 23.—Receipts for the week have been cattle, 888; calves, 42; hogs, 2455; sheep, 6214. Cattle receipts have fallen off about half since last week, but the supply has been equal the demand so no advance in prices. Poorer grade is off about 25 cents, but trade steady on good stuff. 7 cents on good steers. Cows still around 6 cents. Good heifers \$6.25 and spayed stuff 6.60. Seven cars of good mixed Herefords on the market today.

The big receipts of hogs knocked the price from \$9.25 to \$8.65. Some stubble fed California hogs were received and sold for less than local hogs and if the heavy arrivals continue the price may go to \$8.50. The sheep supply has been heavier also, but the demand is good and good wethers are selling all the way from \$1.50 to \$1.60. Trimmed fat lambs \$5.50 to \$5.75 and a few extremely fat at 6 cents, weighing 99 pounds.

OVERHAULING PIPELINE READINESS FOR WINTER

George Tranna, superintendent of the city water department, has a force of men overhauling the city's gravity water line and putting it in condition for winter. Temporary repairs will also be made at the intake, the city council deciding not to construct the permanent intake this season.

All of the leaks in the pipe line are being plugged, trestles painted, and everything made snug. The men will spend two or three weeks on the line.

WORLD RECORDS MADE IN RIFLE TOURNAMENT

World's records were made in profusion at the annual tournament of the New England Rifle Association at Sea Girt, N. J., which was concluded last week. The leading marksmen of the country met in the competitions, and the spectators were treated to a rare exhibition of fine shooting. J. W. Hessian, a member of the victorious Pan-American tournament rifle team, made 49x50 in ten shots at 1,200 yards, shooting the Remington-UMC barrel. This remarkable score broke the previous world's record of 48x50. A. P. Lane, winner of a number of revolver and pistol matches at the Olympic games, and holder of several world's records, made the highest score ever recorded in a single entry 15-shot pistol match, 146x150. Mr. Lane also won the All Comers' Squadded Military Revolver Match, 145x150, shooting Remington-UMC metallic cartridges in all contests.

OLD LAW STRIPS BUTTE FALLS CITY COUNCIL

By ransacking the county court journals of 1904 it is found that on the 10th day of December of that year an order was duly and legally entered declaring Big Butte, Phoenix and all the Ashland precincts except West Ashland to be prohibition territory. This order was entered pursuant to the local option election held November 8 of that year.

As no election has been held since that time reverting this order, these precincts are as such dry territory as any precinct in Josephine county, which is noted dry.

District Attorney Mulkey is proceeding against booze sellers at Butte Falls under the local option law.

NOTORIOUS JUDGE OUT FOR TEDDY

CHICAGO, Sept. 23.—Former United States court judge, Peter Grosscup deserted the regular republican camp here today and is out for Roosevelt. Grosscup in an interview compares Roosevelt and Wilson and declares the colonel to be the pioneer progressive.

"When I left the bench," Grosscup announces, "I said the coming campaign would be the last fought along old lines. Instead it is the first to be fought on new lines. The progressive party is the only one in my judgement offering the needed new political clothes."
