MOTION ARGUED IN STRIKE LEADER TRIAL

SALEM, Mass., Sept. 24.—Before Judge Quinn in the superior court here today, attorneys for Joseph Etor and Arturo Giovanni, accused of murder growing out of the textile mill strike in Lawrence when Anna Laptizo was killed, argued a motion for a bill of particulars. District Attorney Atwill opposed the motion. The real trial of the labor leaders will not begin until next Monday.

SAYS WALDO APPOINTED CRIMINALS AS POLICEMEN

NEW YORK, Sept. 24.—That Police Commissioner Waldo appointed policemen with criminal records was the testimony here today of James Creelman head of the civil service commission who testified in the Aldermanic probe growing out of the Rosenthal murder case.

In two cases where the men were charged with perjury Creelman asserted, Waldo took the matter out of the commission's hands and personally appointed the men.

WILSON'S PROSPECT BRIGHT SAYS BRYAN

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Sept. 24.—At the Alexandria last night William J. Bryan declared that the outlook for Woodrow Wilson and progressive principles in November was bright.

"In the western states," he said, "we are gaining very fast. The split in the republican party varies in different states, but in most districts it is pretty nearly a half and half division."

"I did not meet Colonel Roosevelt on this tour. We are both trying to save the country, but by different methods."

Speaking of the progressive platform planks, which, according to the democrats, have been advocated by him for fifteen years, Bryan said:

"Oh, I had no patent on those things, but it is customary to make acknowledgement of previous possession."

"The democrats are united everywhere. It is very unusual to meet a man who does not intend to vote the ticket. I also hear a good deal about regular republicans coming over."

FIFTH SLAVE GIRL RESCUED FROM FRISCO CHINATOWN

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Sept. 24.—Another slave girl rescued by United States immigration officers from an alley in Chinatown here, making the fifth victim saved, has precipitated today a deadly tong war in the Oriental quarter here.

Loy Lee, one of the most wealthy Chinese here, suspected by the "yellow slave" smugglers, of giving information to the federal officers, has left the city with a price of \$2,000 on his head. Loy has a strong body-guard to protect him from the high-binders on his trail.

DECIES' INFANT SQUALLS IN BAPTISM CEREMONY

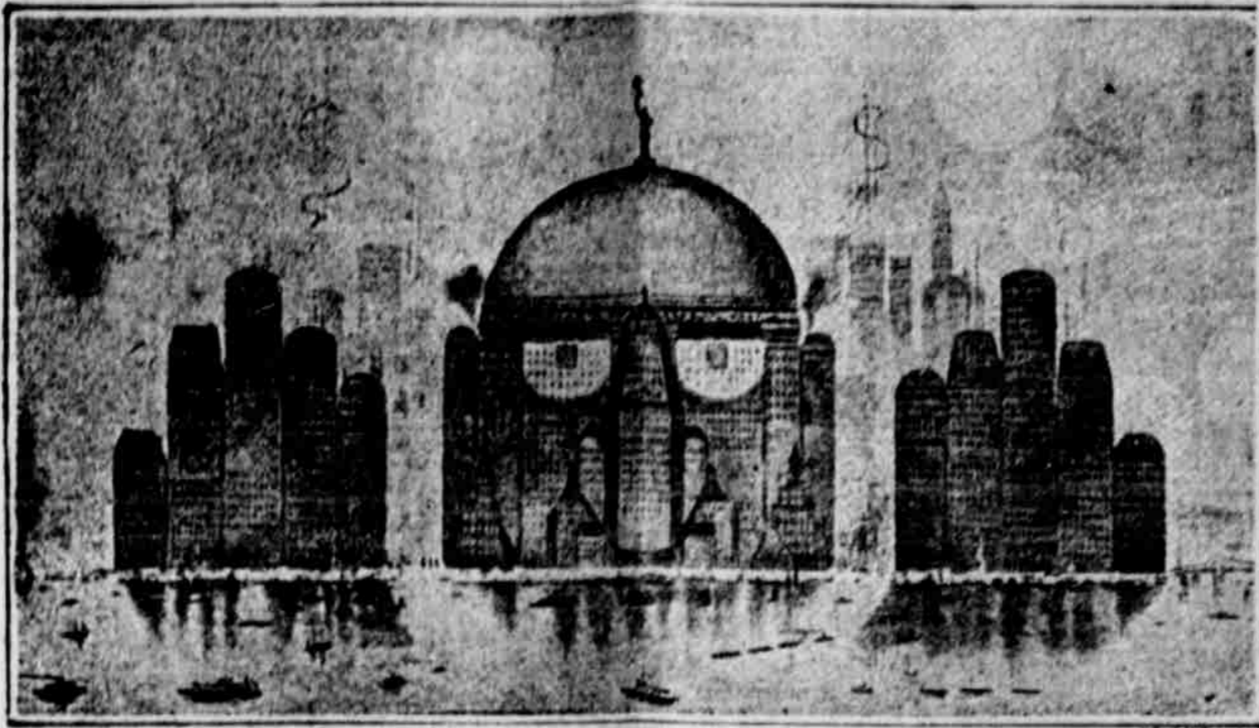

AS AN ENGLISH CARICATURIST SEES NEW YORK CITY SKY LINE.



A SCHEME FOR MAKING NEW YORK MORE IMPRESSIVE TO VISITORS COMING UP THE HARBOR—

NEW COMPANY TO ACQUIRE OIL LANDS

NEW YORK, Sept. 24.—To take over valuable oil land holdings in California, a new company, to do business under the name of California Petroleum Association, is being announced here today, has been incorporated under the laws of the state of Virginia.

The company, with \$17,500,000 of preferred stocks, is to take over 80 per cent of the American Petroleum stock and the same quantity of the American Oil Fields of California, including the Niles Lease Company and the Midland Oil Fields Company.

LAKES TO GULF CANAL IS AHEAD OF PANAMA

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Sept. 24.—Opening the Lakes-to-the-Gulf Deep Waterways association's convention here today, President William Kavanaugh declared that the lake-to-the-gulf canal would prove in time more of a real benefit to the country than would the Panama Canal.

Kavanaugh suggested that after the Panama Canal is opened the machinery used in its construction should be transferred to the United States for use in such projects as the deepening of the Mississippi river and other streams. He asserted that the making of a great waterway of the Mississippi would appreciably lower the cost of living throughout most of the country.

PASADENA SIDESTEPS WAR OVER STREET SPEAKING

PASADENA, Cal., Sept. 24.—There will be no "free speech" war in Pasadena. The city officials took steps to prevent this for all time today when they decided to set aside the big Carmelita playground, a tract of about ten acres, for whatever meetings any organization wants to hold Sundays. There can be half a dozen simultaneous meetings there without any inconvenience. This step was taken following a protest against the closing of the parks to the socialists and W. C. T. U. for Sunday meetings, upon the plea that the park was for a place of rest for citizens generally and should not be turned over to any organization. This apparently has satisfied everyone.

TRIED TO STEAL FINGER RINGS

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 24.—The police are today looking for a burglar who early this morning attempted to steal the rings off the fingers of Mrs. E. M. McDonald 1929 Boren Ave. Mrs. McDonald woke up screaming when she felt man's fingers running over her hands. The intruder stuck a revolver at her and ordered her to shut up.

The cries awakened neighbors who telephoned to the police. In the meantime Mrs. McDonald was lying in bed, a flashlight in her face and a revolver at her temple. The burglar told her he had already gone through the upstairs floor and ordered her to give him all the valuables in the room.

As she got up to comply, the door bell rang and a knock was heard at the back door. The thief ran from the room and jumped through a window. The police fired three shots at him but he escaped in the darkness.

TAFT LEAVES TO CONFER WITH HILLES

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—President Taft started from Washington today for New York to confer with Charles D. Hilles, chairman of the republican national committee and other leaders regarding the political situation. Before leaving the president received delegates to the convention of the American association of Commercial Executives in session here.

President Taft will go to Scranton tomorrow to address the annual gathering of Civil War Governors.
