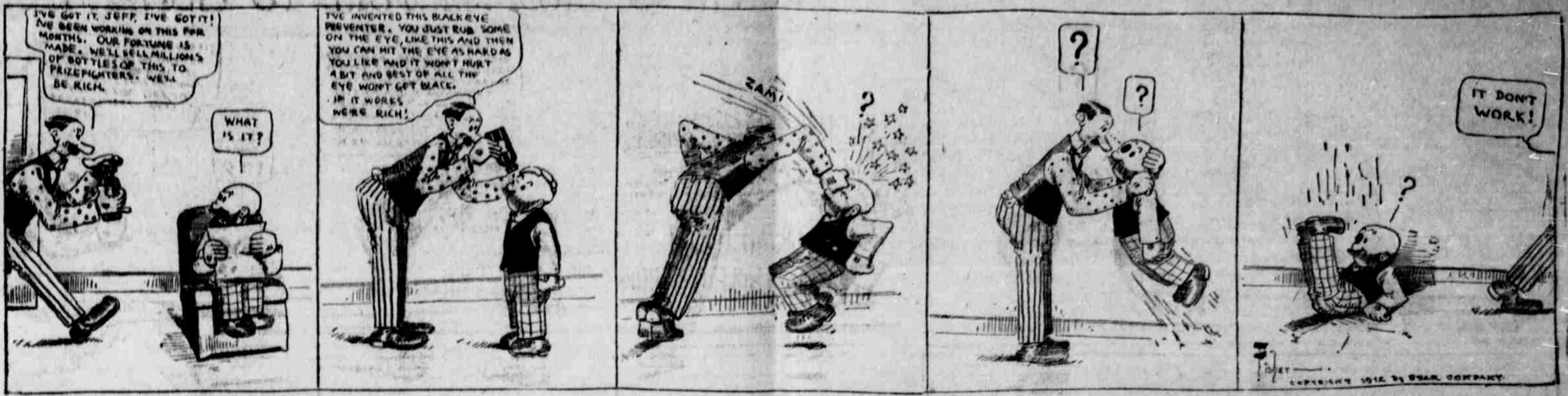


The Inventor Never Really Knows Until He Tries It

CROWDED HOUSE APPLAUDS PLAYERS

Every seat in the Medford opera house was occupied last night to witness the Marion-Claman Players' performance of the beautiful vireo drama of the Canadian northwest, "The Love of the North."

The Marion-Claman Players showed their versatility in last night's performance, forsaking the high finance theme, the swallows and decollete of the drawing room demanded by "The Money King."

Miss Evangeline Claman gave a beautiful characterization of the role of Hilda, the Scotch-French child of the wilderness. Her clear rich voice enthralled her hearers, better enunciation having never been heard on a local stage.

Jules Beaubien was etched in powerful mastery by Ben Claman who gave the noble young French-Canadian a virility, caution and cool courage upon which improvement could not well be made.

Frank Burke gave every touch needed to set off to its height the accomplished, insidious villainy of McDonald, the civil engineer. C. Price Manion gave a strong and realistic portrayal of McTavish, the greedy, inhuman, Scotch father of Hilda, who boasted of his Presbyterianism and his kirk.

Olis Eaton made a very handsome and convincing Huntley and furnished many a laugh with his droll American humor. Miss Gladys Fuller deserves much credit for her clever rendition of the character of Baptiste, the friend of Jules.

Few of the audience guessed that behind the black beard and rough "make-up" was a woman's face, and that the gruff voice with its perfect dialect was that of the pretty little woman who played the role of Kate Roberts in "The Money King" of the night before.

A crowd of between 500 and 600 persons began congregating in front of the Medford opera house as early as 7 o'clock congesting the streets and jamming the sidewalk for half a block, and when the doors were thrown open at 7:45 the 200 free seats were filled in about 10 minutes.

ROUND-UP BEGINS WITH BIG CROWD

PENDLETON, Ore., Sept. 25.—Its streets crowded with the advance guard of visitors and with range riders trained down "fine," Pendleton today is ready for the cry of "let her buck" which will start tomorrow the round-up, the great western show in which the cowboy, the cowgirl and the Indian are the chief attractions.

Riders, ropers, buckaroos, steer haidloggers and Indians all are here and it is estimated 60,000 visitors will see them fight for supremacy in the haidlogging, and bronch "busting" contests, the "drunken ride," and other like events.

The entrants include the greatest men and women riders of the range. Bucking contests among the women will be a feature. The round-up lasts three days, tomorrow, Friday and Saturday.

After several rather tame affairs in the boxing line, a go between boys of the class of Bracken and Williams should be worth while.

One thing the ticket buyers will see is a pair of boxers that will be boxing all the way, with no letup. Both Williams and Bracken are in good shape, and with the road work and boxing stunts will be in the best possible shape for a real regular swatfest.
