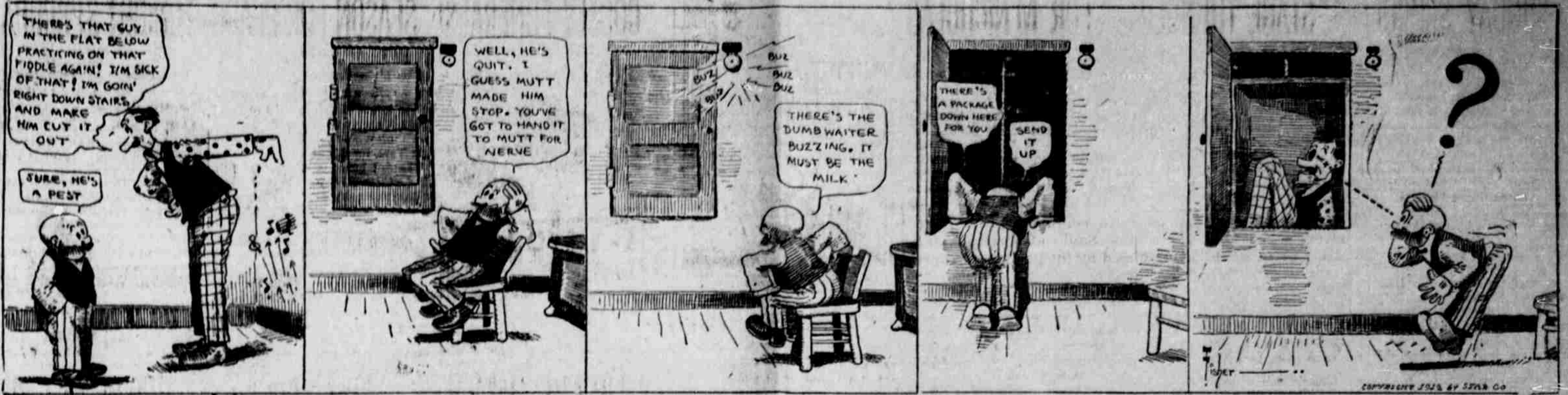

GAVE LIFE BLOOD TO SAVE GIRL'S LIFE

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Sept. 27.—Saved from suicide by the life-blood of a waiter whom she had never seen, Miss Anna Bohlin, young and comely, today is on the road to recovery following an operation for the transfusion of blood.

Relatives of the girl were at dinner in the cafe when a friend entered and announced that unless someone could be found willing to give up lifeblood, Miss Bohlin would die.

"What's the matter with me?" he asked. If I could help save the girl's life by spilling a little blood I will be only too glad. It does not matter that I have never seen her."

The dinner was left unfinished, relatives rushing to the telephone. "We have found the man who will save Anna's life," they telephoned the hospital physicians.

Schwarz was rushed to the hospital and placed on the operating table besides the girl. Arteries in the arms of each were opened and tied together, and the transfusion of blood began.

Albert Wilford, wealthy uncle of Miss Bohlin, tendered Schwarz \$100. "Let's us wait until Miss Bohlin recovers."

DEAD INDIAN ROAD TO KLAMATH FINISHED

H. S. Palmerlee, who has a home-stand out in the Dead Indian country, informs the Tidings that the road between Ashland and Klamath Falls is being put into excellent shape for travel both with automobiles and teams, says the Ashland Tidings.

G. W. Jones has finished the work to the county line and a stretch of road in Klamath county, between Clover creek and the Jackson-Klamath county line, is all that remains uncompleted. A crew of about 20 men is now at work under the direction of the Klamath county authorities, and the road should be completed in about two weeks if the weather remains good.

When this is completed the Dead Indian road to Klamath Falls will be much better than the Green Springs road, which has heretofore been principally used between that city and Ashland. Klamath Falls has completed a fine automobile road from that city to Pelican bay, and by following this route Crater Lake can be reached about as easily by the Rogue river route, thus giving tourists an opportunity to see new scenery each way. The route is highly beautiful and almost if not quite equal to the northern route.

The route via Lake of the Woods is a shorter cut, but not as yet good for automobile travel, says Mr. Palmerlee, but should be improved as soon as possible. This portion of the road, however, is entirely in Klamath county.

BUCKAROO EXPLOITS AROUSE ENTHUSIASM

PENDELTON, Ore., Sept. 27.—Thoroughly inflamed into the mysteries of "hog-tying," "bulldogging," and other exploits of the buckaroo, twenty-five thousand North Western and Eastern visitors, hungry for more thrills, crowded the arena here today to witness the second day's events in the Pendleton Round-Up.

Man and beast met in a fierce fight for supremacy in the wildest of wild west exhibitions, "bulldogging." Late Towman, Cheyenne's champion, was the winner. He "bulldogged" his steer after the most savage battle ever seen in a round-up.

Leaping from his horse's back he seized the steer by the horns with his hands and by the nose with his teeth. Despite the steer's plunging, Towman held his grip. Slowly he dragged down the steer's head till his feet were firm on the ground. He tried hard to drag the steer to the earth but could not get it off its feet. Finally determined to bulldog the animal dead if he could not alive, he twisted the steer's neck inch by inch till with a hideous snap distinctly audible in the grandstand he broke the creature's neck and the big steer rolled to the ground—but "bulldogged."

To the newcomers to the cow country, the work of the women buckaroos was the most thrilling of the round-up's events.
