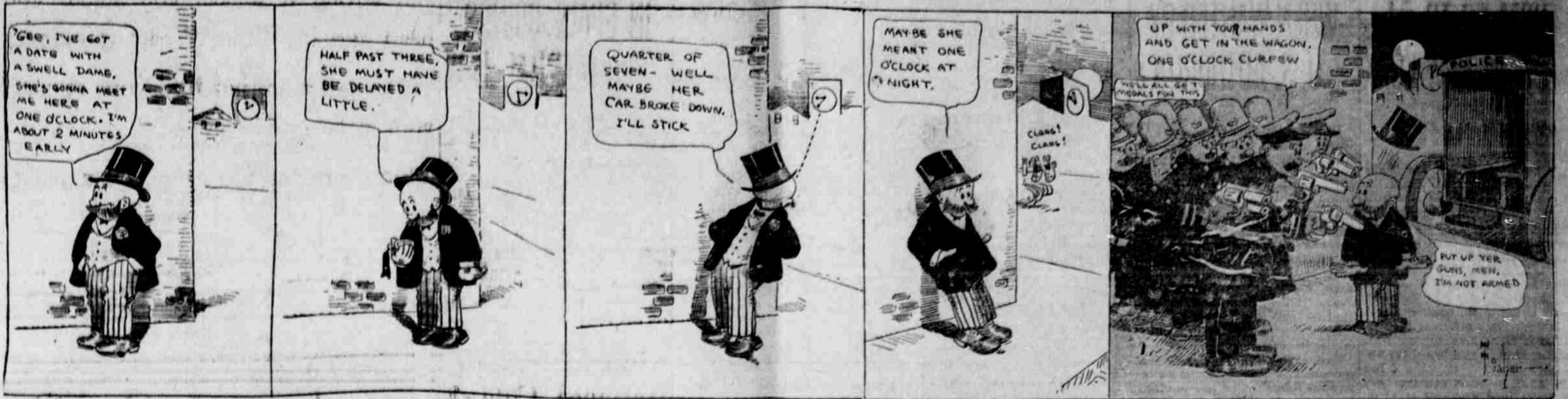


Oh, Yes, Now That Broadway Has a Curfew

\$100,000 BLAZE IN HOTEL AT OAKLAND

OAKLAND, Cal., Sept. 28.—It was estimated today that the damage by fire to the Hotel St. Marks here would reach \$100,000. The fire was spectacular in the extreme. When flames spread from an adjoining meat market, guests scurried to the street in their night clothes. A mad rush was made for the fire escapes by guests on the upper floors, and the elevators were worked constantly carrying frightened guests to safety. The smoke filling the hallways caused a near-panic.
