DIX CANDIDACY IS TO BE DROPPED

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Sept. 30.—That the candidacy of Governor Dix of New York will be eliminated at the democratic state convention which meets at noon tomorrow seem certain at noon today. It is believed that Charles F. Murphy is dropping Dix. A belligerent atmosphere is everywhere and the prediction is that the convention will be stormy. The adherents of Dix denounce the public criticism of Governor Dix by Woodrow Wilson, democratic nominee for president. They assert their platform will be progressive; they defend Dix's administration and answer charges of extravagance by comparing the administrations of former Governor Hughes with that of Dix. Senator O'Grady is here and hopes that Murphy will not interfere.

BUD ANDERSON WILL BOX DANNY O'BRIEN

Once more the fans of Medford may see Bud Anderson, the clever lightweight of Vancouver, Wash., in action. Arrangements are now being made to stage the boxing contests under new management and it is practically assured that Bud Anderson and Danny O'Brien of Portland will be the opening attraction, which will take place on or about October 15. Should the management secure these two popular boxers the fans of Medford would be assured of the most scientific boxing exhibition ever seen in Medford, as O'Brien is rated as one of the cleverest boys in the ring today and Anderson needs no introduction to the followers of the game in this city. These boys have had five battles, the last going fifteen rounds to a draw, and the question of superiority is still undecided between them. For a certain-raiser, Frankie O'Brien, Danny's brother, may be pitted against Freddie Anderson, a brother of Bud's, in an eight-round preliminary, and this alone should be worth the price of admission, as they are both clever and aggressive boys.

PATTON REGAINS TITLE FROM SOOY-SMITH

In a special match event on the Nat alleys Saturday Patton regained the laurels which he recently lost to Sooy-Smith in one of the best exhibitions of bowling that has been seen on the alleys this year. The "old champ" went right after his lost title and won in a quick and deciding manner, taking three straight games from Sooy-Smith. The highest score of the series was rolled by Patton in the first game, when he hit out 226, and followed right up with 219 in the second game.
