Although not directly involved in the Balkan affair Italy, from its present conflict with Turkey, is expected to lend efficient aid to Greece in sweeping the Aegean and Ionian seas of any Turkish vessels. Turkey's navy at best is of little consequence in the impending struggle but the Moslem army, fired by fanaticism, is one of the most powerful in the world and desperate battles are to be expected in the Balkan fastnesses before the Turk is beaten—even if his armies are forced to fight alone against their confederation of foes.
