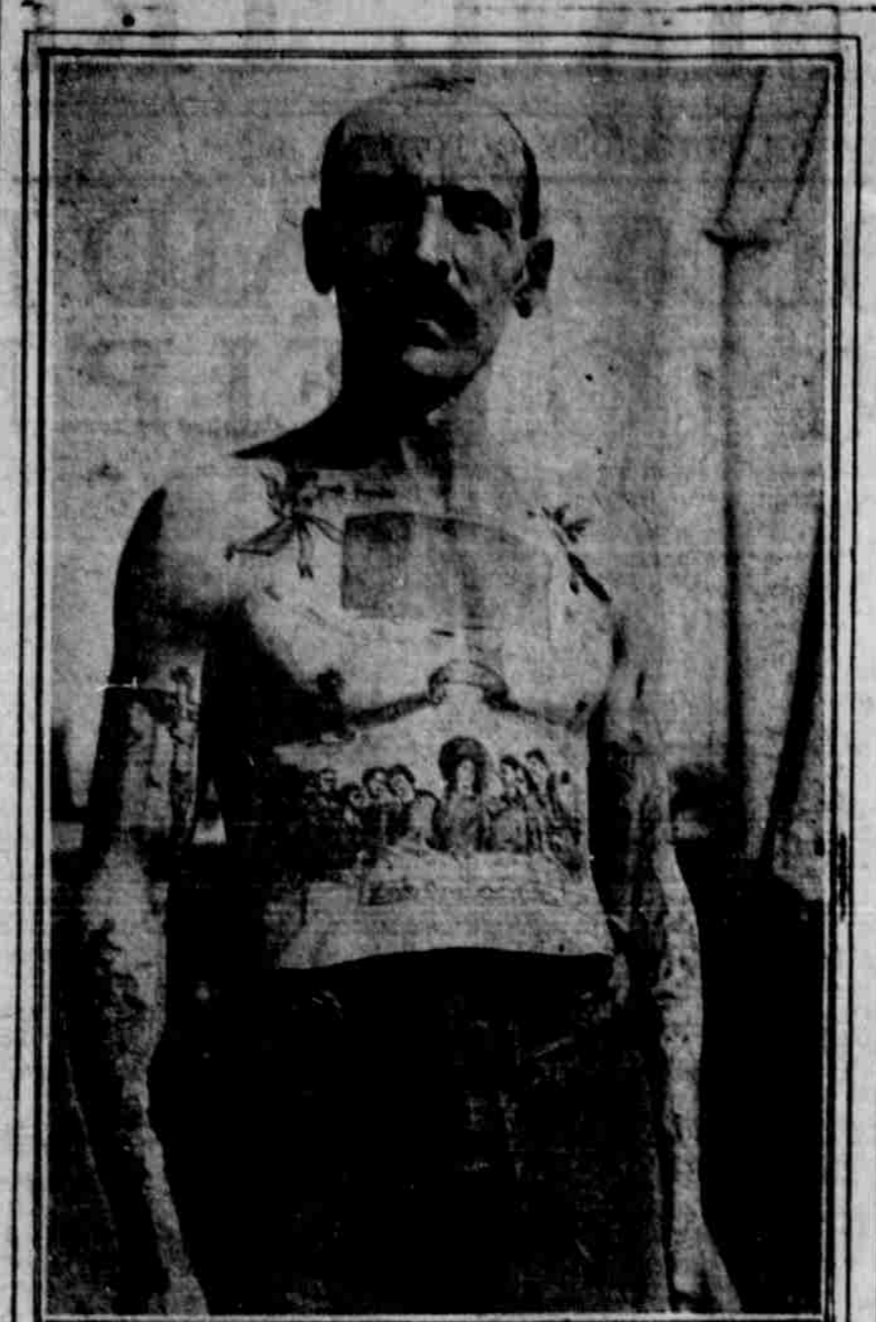

Doing Something Worth While

(From The Oregonian) According to the Medford Mail-Tribune, Mr. Enoch R. Smith, on his little four-acre brush farm, situated near Gold Hill, Jackson county, is doing something worth while.

Let it be understood that to do anything really worth while one must do something of benefit to humanity and the world at large.

To do some great deed for personal benefit or aggrandizement is worth while only in a selfish sense.

Wheat straws six feet in length, 65 to 100 springing from one current kernel, with heads averaging six inches, presaging a yield of at least 100 bushels to the acre, is a possibility for Southern Oregon that has been exclusively demonstrated by Enoch M. Smith upon his little brushland farm just west of Gold Hill.

From this short paragraph it seems that Mr. Smith has succeeded in producing a quality of wheat that will give a yield heretofore unprecedented.

So large is the amount given per acre that it may, in operations on a commercial scale, have to be discounted somewhat; but there seems no doubt about the accomplishment of a great purpose by this brushland farmer, and great should be his reward.

Someone has said, in substance, that the man who makes two blades of grass grow where one grew before is conferring a blessing upon humanity.

And it is true that anyone adding to the world's production adds to the world's happiness. If any man could discover some means of adding one grain of wheat to each wheat head grown, or but one grain of corn to each ear produced, or but one potato to each hill raised, he would confer a greater blessing upon humanity than the builder of many cities or the discoverer of a second Comstock gold ledge.

It seems strange that so few undertake plant breeding. Most men who plant seeds seem satisfied to go on year after year simply planting and harvesting with no thought as to the why or wherefore of reproduction beyond the idea that they must have good seed.

Yet more than likely each of these planters would exercise judgment and discretion in breeding livestock. Beyond a few homely facts about planting pumpkins and water-melons contiguous, or the mixing of citrons and cantaloupe, and a few other simple truths of that kind, they know nothing about the close relationship of plants, the pollination of blossoms or the fundamental principles of reproduction and crossing of varieties.

One does not have to be a scientist to create new varieties in plant life. Perhaps Mr. Smith will tell you that he learned all he knows as he went along. Certainly Luther Burbank, the most successful plant grower of our times, was not a scientist when he began as a boy to increase the yield and

better the quality of plant products. These simple truths ought to be brought home particularly to the young men who attend our agricultural colleges. These students are given all of the scientific training necessary to start them off at once on the road to doing something worth while for themselves and their fellow men by increasing the yield or quality of some of our staple products and by creating some new fruit, vegetable or cereal.

Let these young men study the evolution of the tomato. Let them learn how it came about that the little Jerusalem cherry of sixty or seventy years ago, then cultivated and grown as a house plant for decorative purposes, has come to be one of our chief vegetables. The field is large, the workers few, the competition negligible, but few occupations offer more satisfaction or better profits than study of plant life.

ACCUSE BOSTON BROKER OF THEFT

BOSTON, Oct. 3.—Stephen Dow, a former prominent member of Boston's stock exchange, was arrested here this afternoon for the larceny of \$146,990 from the Franklin and Algonquin mining company.

Dow is president and director of a score of mining concerns and was interested in the company which he is alleged to have robbed.

Hundreds of men and women of small means are hit hard by the alleged peculations. Dow, until he was expelled yesterday, had been a member of the stock exchange for eight years.

District Attorney Pelletier this afternoon declared that a sweeping investigation of the stock exchange would follow Dow's arrest.

The county court met in regular session Wednesday but did not transact any county business aside from routine matters. They audited the bills, heard reports of road supervisors and adjourned.
