WAUWATOSA, Oct. 3 .- Ralph De Palma, driving true to form and the luck which he exhibited at Elgin a month ago, today with a Mercedes car won the eighth running of the Vanderbilt cup automobile race from a field of eight starters. The time for the 299 miles 2764 feet was 4:20:33.54. This was at a speed of sixty-nine miles an hour, five miles slower than last year's running.

FOUR FLUSH PURITY

THEODORE Roosevelt publicly branded Alton B. Par-ker as a liar when in 1904 he asserted that the trusts were financing the republican campaign.

Treasurer Sheldon of the national republican committee states on the witness stand that practically 75 per cent of the money received and expended to elect Theodore Roosevelt, came from the trusts.

J. Pierpont Morgan, John D. Archbold, Henry Frick and George Gould each contributed \$100,000. President Roosevelt's former private secretary, George B. Cortelyou was chairman of the committee, and Mr. Roosevelt must have known where the coin came from-yet he denied that the trusts or Wall street contributed any funds.

William Flinn of Pittsburgh, admits that he made a written contract with Senator Matt Quay, whereby he agreed to deliver the city of Pittsburgh to Quay in return for his own election to the United States senate. Mr. Flinn states that he spent \$102,000 of his money to carry Pennsylvania for Roosevelt in the 1912 primaries,

There never was a more brazen effrontery than that of Flinn's, as boss of Pittsburgh. Compared to Flinn, Lorimer is pure. Yet Mr. Roosevelt, who wouldn't sit at the same table with Lorimer, extols Flinn and accepts his money, as he did the trusts' when president-and at the same time denounces the political bosses who fail to support him.

Mr. Roosevelt never made any of his campaign contributions public. He posed as an advocate of publicity, but never published an item regarding his own campaigns, just as he posed as a trust buster and never curbed a trust

Mr. Roosevelt poses as a progressive, but his sole test of progress is support of his third term ambition. 
