

GLAVIS SALARY HELD UP WHILE CONDUCT PROBED

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Oct. 3.—That the state board of control has taken definite and specific exception to the conduct of L. R. Glavis as secretary of state conservation commission, while it has not sought to impeach his conduct as secretary of the state water board, was evidenced today when the payroll of the water board, including Glavis' September salary in that department at \$150, was received by State Controller Nye fully approved. The Glavis item of \$150 in the conservation payroll for September was held up.

Commissioners Neylan, Seavey and Humphrey of the control board refuse to explain their reason for deciding that Glavis was not entitled to pay for his work for the conservation commission, but they did not deny the suggestion that they had done this to bring the conservation commission to an investigation of Glavis' alleged activity on behalf of the Weed and West Side Lumber Companies, as charged by Surveyor General Kingsbury.

At former governor Pardee's request, the control board has agreed to go no further with the matter until Pardee and his assistants have inquired into Glavis' conduct. Pardee declared that he was in no position yet to make up his mind as to the facts in the case.

AUSTRALIANS HERE TO PLAY FOOTBALL

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 3.—When the steamship Moana from Australia swung into the dock here today bringing the picked team of rugby players from the Antipodes for a series of games with teams of the California Rugby Union, a large delegation including representatives of both California universities, members of the Olympic, Barbarian and British Empire clubs gave them a rousing reception.

As soon as the Australians landed they were at once escorted to automobiles and whirled away to the Olympic club where they were formally welcomed to the city. The gymnasium of the club was gaily decorated with bunting and flags. Mayor James Rolph welcomed the visitors on behalf of the city and William F. Humphrey, junior, extended greetings on behalf of the Olympic club.

Tonight a smoker will be given in honor of the Australians and tomorrow they will don their football togs for the first limbering up practice in Golden Gate park. On Saturday the first match will be played with the Barbarian club team.

ROOSEVELT CONFERS WITH HIS ADVISORS

OYSTER BAY, N. Y., Oct. 3.—Theodore Roosevelt, progressive candidate for president will confer with Secretary Oscar Davis, Senator Dixon, George W. Perkins and State Chairman Hotchkiss here tonight. At midnight the colonel will start for Washington where he is scheduled to testify before the senate campaign contributions investigating committee tomorrow.

TURKEY TO HIT HARD

Military experts here think that if Turkey effects peace with Italy before the threatened outbreak comes the Sultan's powerful army will have little trouble in defeating the Balkan allies. This belief, however, is predicated upon the assumption that Russia will stand supine and watch the destruction of the Balkan States which she fathered into being with tremendous expenditure of blood and treasure. It also is based upon the belief that other European nations shall not become involved but whether this belief is well founded it is admitted that no man now can say.

Reports that the Turkish forts along the Bosphorus have fired on the Greek steamers have not been confirmed in dispatches from Constantinople but it is possible that censorship may have prevented the affirmation of the report.

Queen Mary of England was much impressed by the London production of "Everywoman," and as a result, it is said, Arthur Collins, managing director of Drury Lane theatre, will be knighted on the king's next birthday.

MORGAN GIVES TO AID TEDDY

good of the country and the people. \$100,000 in 1904

Morgan started his testimony by telling of the contribution of \$100,000 his firm made to the republican campaign in 1904. Then he said, the exigencies of the New York state campaign provoked an additional \$50,000 gift. He admitted close relations with the late Cornelius N. Bliss, treasurer of the republican national committee in 1904, adding:

"Whenever they wanted anything they always sent Bliss to me."

Morgan also admitted that he had conferred frequently with George B. Cortelyou, a former private secretary to Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, but he said no mention was ever made of campaign contributions.

Senator Pomerene here started to question the banker. The questions were politely framed and asked in a well modulated tone. Morgan experienced great difficulty in hearing Senator Pomerene's questions and left the witness chair to get closer to his questioner.

No Cola for Democrats

Morgan denied that his firm had contributed to any other party than the republicans in 1904. He denied also conferences of financiers to agree on which candidate to support. Pomerene asked whether George W. Perkins, the firm's member, on Morgan's instructions had contributed to the 1904 campaign. This he denied. He admitted however, that he might have suggested to Bliss where the latter could get other contributions but he was not sure as to this.

At noon the committee ordered a recess until tomorrow when Colonel Theodore Roosevelt will testify.

Bliss Asked Contribution

Morgan arrived in Washington last night. Every seat was taken in the committee room when he entered this morning accompanied by his son-in-law Herbert Satterlee, his daughter and Mrs. Hamilton. Morgan reached the committee room at exactly 9:55. He was escorted to a private room by Chairman Clapp, where they conversed briefly. Returning to the committee room, Morgan glanced nervously around at the crowd. Chairman Clapp then read published charges that Colonel Roosevelt had commanded Morgan to raise \$100,000 in 1904 and that Morgan telephoned to the former president at Washington thirty minutes later. The banker said this charge was untrue; that he did not receive personal applications for contributions from any candidate.

"So far as I remember," said Morgan, "I did not talk to Roosevelt. The story about the telephone conversation is made out of the whole cloth. I never had any conversation with Roosevelt, either by mail, telephone or telegram. Neither did I communicate either with his secretaries. I do not think that Harriman solicited any contributions from us. The first contribution was solicited by Bliss and the second I think, by both Odell and Bliss."

In 1906 Campaign

Referring to the 1906 campaign Morgan said:

"I paid Treasurer George Sheldon \$2,000 on one occasion. Then a memorandum shows that on October 10 I paid him \$10,000 in cash. Sheldon only visited me once. If I made other contributions they were moderate and inconsequential." Morgan flatly stated that neither he nor any of his business associates contributed to the pre-convention campaigns of 1912. Morgan said that his views were not affected by Judge Alton Parker's views on the trust problem, adding:

"There was no understanding between the 'interests' nor did they meet jointly at any time. So far as I know there was no combination of the interests to favor the republicans in 1904."

Morgan admitted that frequent conferences were held between George W. Perkins and President Mellen, adding:

"Perhaps they may have thought they would be benefited by the election of the republican candidate. But I have found gratitude a very scarce commodity."

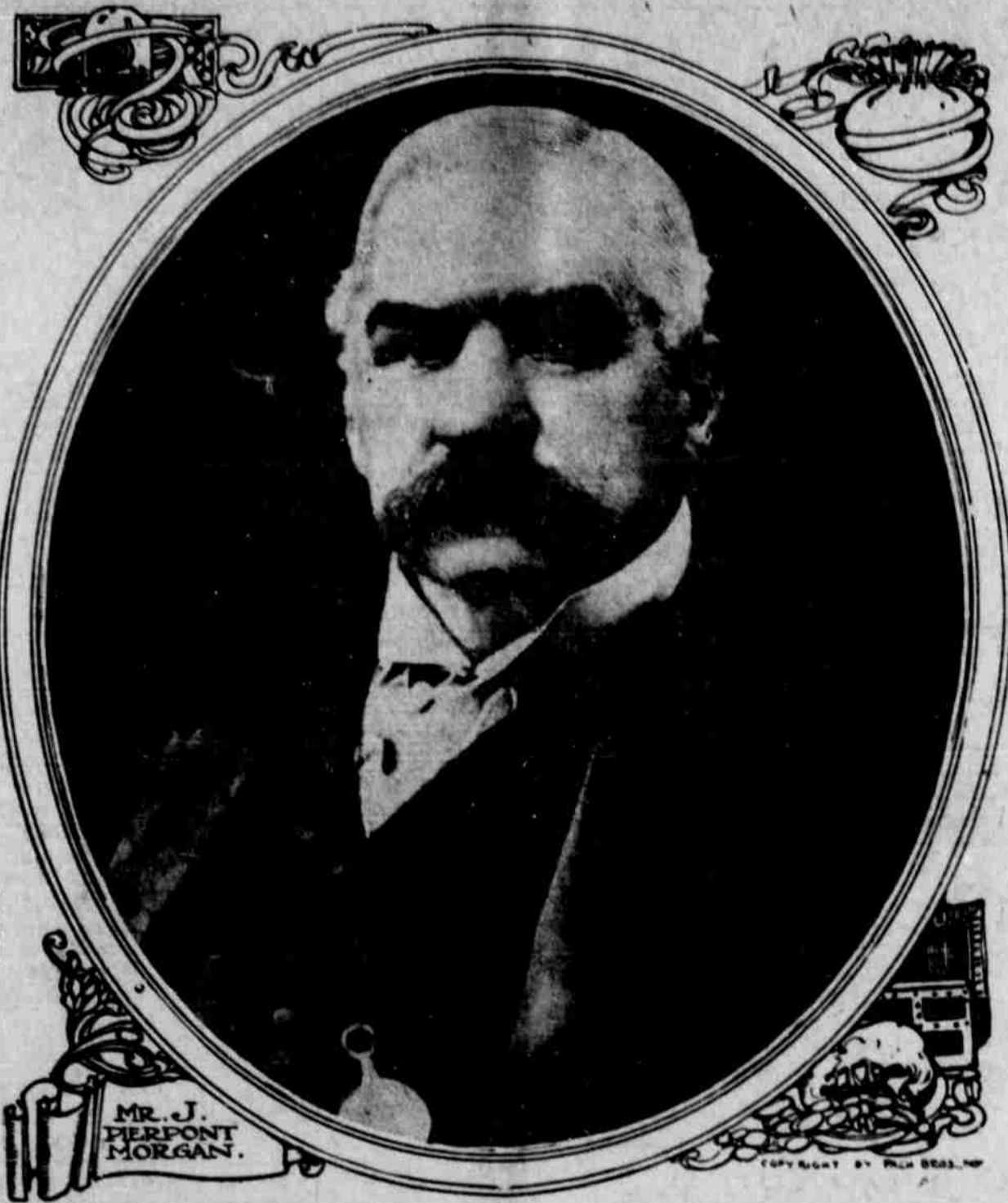
Ruled by Patriotism

The witness said he would have supported the democratic candidate in 1904. "If I thought it would have been better for the country," Morgan's daughter smiled frequently throughout her father's examination but Satterlee seemed extremely nervous. When Morgan told about Bliss coming to his office to get money, Mrs. Satterlee laughed loudly. When Morgan was excused, he shook hands with the committee-men.

Chairman Clapp said he might be needed later and Morgan said he was willing to come back whenever wanted.

Judge Charles Duell, assistant treasurer of the republican national committee in 1904, was the next witness.

RECEIVER NAMED FOR GLEN ROGUE ORCHARDS

In addition to being sued by Henry Mankins to foreclose a \$15,000 mortgage the Glen Rogue orchards are in further trouble. An order was issued in the United States district court Wednesday morning by Judge Bean, at Portland, appointing a receiver for the Glen-Rogue Orchard company, a syndicate incorporated under the laws of South Dakota, with officers residing at Detroit, Mich., owning land in Oregon. John S. Beall of Portland was named receiver. The complainants, Lonie H. MacKinnon, F. W. Schult and Matt Carey make the request for a receiver on the ground that interest on notes held by them has not been paid since April, 1911. MacKinnon, the principal complainant, holds a note for \$1,000, and the others for \$300. The complaint further states that the company's holdings of 1408 acres in Jackson county, a part of which is under cultivation, have been badly neglected.
