

STAR BOXERS TO MEET WEDNESDAY

Probably the best boxing card ever presented to Oregon' fistic enthusiasts, has been secured for this city Wednesday evening, Oct. 16th.

Manager Frankie Edwards, guiding star of the Medford Athletic club and Mr. Donald, representing Bud Anderson after several conferences have agreed on the date and O'Brien's consent was telegraphed last night.

O'Brien will arrive in Medford Monday and finish a thorough course of training which he began ten days ago.

This match was secured for Medford when Klamath Falls and a California city were trying to cinch the bout.

The O'Brien and Anderson match has been hanging fire for some time and new interest was revived lately when there seemed a possible chance that the boys could be brought together here. Throughout the states of Oregon and Washington where Anderson and O'Brien are well known to all fight fans there has been a flurry of newspaper comment regarding the match and the probable outcome, they having met on several occasions neither having been able to earn better than a draw verdict in any of their bouts. It has been more than a year since Anderson and O'Brien have engaged in their last fistic combat and both boys since have been coming to the front with remarkable speed showing wonderful improvement in their respective contests, in which they met some of the leading and best known boxers in the country thus gaining the experience and confidence necessary to all successful boxers.

To round out a splendid card arrangements have been made to have Freddie Anderson, a brother of Bud's, box Frankie O'Brien, a younger brother of Danny's in a six round preliminary.
