General Pung has 20,000 mutinous troops to back up his demand. A force of 5,000 government troops is marching from Manking to meet the rebels.

LONDON, Oct. 5.—King George and Queen Mary slept late today following a ball given by them at Balmoral Castle last night to the tenants of their estate. The ball was of a Highland character, the king wearing Highland kilts and the queen wearing clan tartans. The king and queen led the grand march through a double line of Balmoral Highlanders.

The queen danced every number on the program, graciously distributing her favors among the tenants.

### THREE MASKED MEN ROB A KANSAS TRAIN

FORT SMITH, Ark., Oct. 5.—Three masked men held up and robbed the north-bound Kansas City & Southern passenger train No. 4 three miles northeast of Poteau, Okla., tonight, and after opening two safes in the express car with nitroglycerine, obtained a large quantity of loot, including the registered mail. The train was brought to a halt near Poteau by the application of air brakes. Simultaneously the two robbers made their appearance in the express and baggage car and forced the express messenger, baggageman and conductor behind a pile of trunks and applied explosives to the safes, while another bandit stood guard outside. When entrance was forced to the safes the men gathered all the valuables in a gunnysack and after intimidating the clerks in the mail car added all the registered mail in sight to the loot. They escaped to the mountains. The passengers were not molested.

### GRANTS PASS CUTS RATES ON WATER

GRANTS PASS, Oct. 5.—After having landed a solar plexus blow on the rates that can be charged by public service corporations for electricity for light and power within the city of Grants Pass, the council has now taken a rap at water rates, and an ordinance passed at the regular Thursday night session of the municipal legislature made radical reductions all down the line.

The object of the ordinance is to establish maximum rates for water for household, domestic use and mechanical purposes, and for the testing of water meters furnished to consumers. Maximum rates were established making the charge for 5,000 or less gallons used per month cost the consumer fifty cents, the rate charged at present being \$1.00. For quantities over the 5,000 gallons, the rate fixed is eight cents for each 1,000 gallons up to 20,000, and five cents per 1,000 above 20,000 gallons.

The ordinance also provides that the water company shall furnish and maintain free of charge, accurate water meters, and shall bring the water to the property line of the persons who apply for its use.

### BARNUM'S PROFIT FOR YEAR 37 SIMOLEONS

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 5.—The annual report of the Rogue River Valley railroad company, as submitted to the state railroad commission, shows the company's net operating income for the year was \$37,800. Its operating revenues were \$15,968.30, and its operating expenses were \$15,267.31, and its taxes were \$663.17.

### SUICIDAL PRINCE BARRED FROM UNITED STATES

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—Because he attempted suicide last July Prince Ludobie Pignatelli d'Aragon, son of the pretender to the Spanish throne is today debarred from entry into the United States.

The prince, who arrived on the steamship France, is held by the immigration authorities on Ellis Island awaiting a disposition of his case.


