(4) For the purpose of this or-dinance, a wholesale liquor dealer shall be taken to mean any person who sells or in any manner disposes of intoxicating liquors in original packages and not to be drunk on the premises. Wholesale liquor dealers shall be divided into three classes: (a) Wholesale liquor dealers who sell intoxicating liquors to other dealers in intoxicating liquors only.
