ORDINANCE NO. 705.

An Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 475 of the City of Medford, entitled "An Ordinance Providing for the Licensing and Regulating of the Traffic in Intoxicating Liquors, within the City of Medford, providing penalties for violation thereof and repealing all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict therewith." Passed by the city council of the City of Medford upon March 21, 1911, and approved by the mayor on March 22, 1911, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 1. Sub-section No. 4 of section 1, of the Ordinance No. 475 of the City of Medford, entitled: "An ordinance providing for the licensing and regulating of the traffic in intoxicating liquors within the City of Medford, providing penalties for violation thereof and repealing all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict therewith. Passed by the city council of the City of Medford upon March 21, 1911, and approved by the mayor on March 22, 1911, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

(a) For the purpose of this ordinance, a wholesale liquor dealer shall be taken to mean any person who sells or in any manner disposes of intoxicating liquors in original packages and not to be drunk on the premises. Wholesale liquor dealers shall be divided into three classes:

(1) Wholesale liquor dealers who sell intoxicating liquors to other dealers in intoxicating liquors only, and who make no sales direct to the consumers.

(2) Wholesale liquor dealers selling beer and malt products only in bottles and who bottle the same on their premises covered by their license and who sell to consumers in quantities of not less than twelve quart bottles or its equivalent in any one sale.

(3) Wholesale liquor dealers who sell in quantities to consumers direct.

Sec. 2. Section 7 of said ordinance is hereby amended to read as follows: "The license fee for the sale of intoxicating liquors in the City of Medford shall be as follows:

License of liquor dealers dealing in beer and malt products only and who bottle the same on their premises and sell only in quantities fixed by this ordinance three hundred (\$300.00) dollars.

License of liquor dealers selling to consumers four hundred (\$400.00) dollars.

Social clubs two hundred (\$200.00) dollars.

The foregoing ordinance was passed by the city council of the City of Medford on the 1st day of October, 1912, by the following vote:
