

## BISHOP SCADDING PLANNING FINE MEDFORD CHURCH

The Rt. Rev. Charles Scadding D. D. Bishop of Oregon, arrived in Medford on Saturday, and preached twice yesterday in St. Mark's church. He spoke of his fondness for, and belief in Medford, and the many improvements noticeable since his last visit, and said it was a pleasure to note the optimism and initiative of the people. He believed the "boom" and "hot air" periods, which are the "growing pains" of a small town, are now over, and that Medford was striking a steady conservative gait.

**Gothic Church Planned**  
"Our church here" said the bishop "is not as strong as it should be, but we are growing, we need the same enthusiasm in building up the religious life of the community as in developing its commerce. We have plans for the finest Gothic stone church in Oregon. The foundations have been well laid, and as soon as sufficient money is subscribed we shall complete the structure. This will cost at least \$10,000 and will greatly add to the beauty of the city."

Bishop Scadding's duties take him into all parts of Western Oregon, and last month he went to Eastern Oregon where he attended the convention of the Central Oregon Development League at Lakeview. In company with President Kerr of the Agricultural college, Bill Hanley of Burns, C. C. Chapman, secretary of the Portland commercial club, and other business men of Portland, Bishop Scadding went by motor car from The Dalles to Prineville, Lakeview, Klamath Falls and Bend and at all the small towns the party was received by representative ranchers and local commercial clubs, and many good speeches were made.

**Stop All Knocking**  
"The best advertisement Oregon can have," said Bishop Scadding, "is a well developed, prosperous state, and agriculture is the greatest factor in development. I was greatly impressed with two things evident in our inland empire—the growing spirit of co-operation among the ranchers, and small towns, the expressed desire to stop all "knocking" and to get together and pull together for the good of all. No state needs this more than Oregon at the present time, and the church needs it as well as the state. The second thing that impressed me was the courage of the people in the sage brush land. It requires determination, doggedness and hard work to take a section of sage brush country and make it raise crops. This our people in Eastern Oregon have done by dry farming; and of course where it is possible to get water on that volcanic ash, alfalfa and other crops are large."

**Oregon First His Motto**  
"I was impressed with the splendid work which our Agricultural college is doing at its demonstration farm at Metolius. Even farmers need to learn how, and up-to-date, scientific farming, such as is being taught at the Agricultural college, and at their demonstration experimental farms can greatly increase the production of existing farms. The old-style farmer is naturally conservative, and must be shown in order to be convinced that scientific farming gives the best results, and to do this, demonstration farms should be placed at important centers all over the state. Bishop Paddock, who is the Episcopal Bishop of Eastern Oregon, and I attended nearly all the meetings of the league at Lakeview and then went to Klamath Falls and Crater Lake."  
"The trip through Eastern Oregon was inspiring and delightful, but I am glad to be back among the hills and orchards of Southern Oregon and especially in Medford and the Rogue River valley, the beauty spot of Oregon. "Oregon First" is my motto."
