

TECHNICALITIES FAIL TO FREE IRONWORKERS

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 9.—That the attorneys representing the forty-seven members of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Ironworkers, charged with illegally transporting dynamite intended for taking advantage of technicalities to free their clients, was indicated at the opening of court today when Joseph Lettler, attorney for the defense, sought to have the indictments quashed.

Lettler filed a demurrer and a motion to quash the indictments because United States District Attorney Charles W. Miller, in his opening statement, discussed explosions, loss of life and loss of property. He argued that the defendants were not accused of any of these crimes, and asked that the indictments be dismissed. Judge Anderson promptly overruled the motion.

All Exceptions Taken

The defense attorneys also announced their determination to take exception every time explosions are referred to. In resuming his opening statement for the defense this morning, Attorney William N. Harding emphasized statements that the defendants are accused of having illegally transported dynamite, and not of having participated in dynamitings or explosions.

Judge Anderson sustained an objection interposed by Prosecutor Miller when Harding shouted that Miller had attacked the ironworkers' organization. "I want it distinctly understood," said Judge Anderson, "that no labor organization is being tried here and that organized labor is not on trial."

was A. E. Clark, Bull Moose, who took exception to the Mail Tribune's remarks upon the Third Term party's convention, in which the assertion was made that the progressives showed rank ingratitude when they did not nominate either Fred Mulkey or Jonathan Bourne.

"Senator Bourne" said Mr. Clark, "refused to join the progressive party, although he declared for Roosevelt. Moreover he withdrew his candidacy before a formal ballot was taken."

His Ability

But the statement that ranked the Bull Moose candidate was the assertion that he was a mediocre lawyer and the hint that he had shot himself in the Wilde trial for notoriety.

"Do I look like a man who would shoot himself?" he asked. "We don't know how a man who would shoot himself looks, but you don't look like a man that anyone would take a shot at" he was told.

Mr. Clark then related the story of his long legal battle to send crooked bankers to prison and the vicious fight made against him by desperate men who would stop at nothing. Regarding himself he said:

"As to my standing at the bar, ask any reputable lawyer and they will vouch for my ability. During the past three years, I have had as many cases in court as any other lawyer in Oregon, and been as successful. Porter J. Neff, who knows of my career in Minnesota before coming to Oregon, will vouch for my standing."

Mr. Neff states that Mr. Clark is one of the leading lawyers of the state.

Whereupon the Mail Tribune apologized, having based its assertion upon the fact that he was unknown outside the metropolis.

"Have you ever been to Crater Lake?"

"No," replied Mr. Clark, "this is my first vacation in seven years, but I intend to go and if elected, can be depended upon to work for the lake."

Paget Is Cheerful

B. Lee Paget was the next caller. He is the prohibition candidate, and full of enthusiasm.

"Hope springs eternal in the human breast" said the Mail Tribune man, "and such hopeless hope as yours deserves reward. Let's have a drink."

"That's the first time I've been asked to take a drink during my campaign. Much obliged, but I'll have to decline" replied Mr. Paget, "but don't forget I'm running."
