SALMON LIFE BEING PHOTOED

Geo. M. Weister, official photographer of the Southern Pacific system is at the Annet dam to make films covering all features of the salmon hatchery work as he finds it on the Rogue. He will illustrate the work of corraling the Chinooks within the government rack preparatory to taking the eggs from them as soon as they become "ripe," and later when the big fish are driven into the slaughtering pen or are taken in nets preparatory to yielding up their lives to the propagation of the species, other films will be made.

State Fish Warden Clanton and Game Warden Finley are expected in a day or two to also be on the scene.

The racks are located just below the Golden Drift dam, no salmon being permitted to ascend the river above the dam.

The moving picture camera used by Mr. Weister makes a film 300 feet in length at each exposure. After exposure the film is taken to the laboratory at Portland where it is developed, and it is then exhibited throughout the country by the Southern Pacific's lecturers. Its use is also permitted in all the independent moving picture theaters that desire it, and will probably be later shown in this city.
