

## PUNK PLAYING LOST GAME FOR GIANT TWIRLER

BOSTON, Mass., Oct. 10.—The grand old dope skids off the trail and vanishes for good and all. Blown full of holes, twisted out of gear and kicked in the slats, there isn't any dope to work with today. There is nothing left now but two ball clubs fighting blindly, madly for the world's championship.

All footwork is gone, headwork has vanished and the contestants now are face to face, attempting to pound out each other's brains. There is nothing left but the wallop. The first club that begins playing regular ball may strike an easy trail to the crest, or if neither settles down, the old haymaker may decide it about next Wednesday in the last round of the seventh game.

**Errors Lose Game**  
After beating Jeff Tearean in New York, Boston yesterday found the Giant defense so wide apart that six unearned tallies were scored where, with even fair support behind Matty, there should have been but one. Fletcher slipped them four—a muff at the plate presented the other. With a ball club drawing six unearned runs in one afternoon by the opposing team's defensive play, the game can be summed up briefly and without using burning oratory to explain the answer.

Taking no credit from Boston's game, or the team's driving assault or the pinch hits the stars tore off, Matty's third world series start should have netted him a third first-game victory. The Giants pounded Collins and Hall from the field, while Matty's support cost him the verdict—not his boxwork. Boston hit him hard, but through his coolness and courage, only a single run was earned.

**Matty Kept Cool**  
Matty's support cracked around him, but he swung on gamely, grimly fighting and planning and staying off defeat by a combination of heart and brains. The only Giants who rallied behind him were Herzog and Murray, who broke down the Red Sox defense, almost unaided, drove Stahl's two pitchers from the box.

The first team which settles down to its normal stride should win the series hands down. No world's series form is needed now—just a little, everyday humdrum ability. Neither team played a first-class game, the fielding verged from superhuman to super punk—from big league to class X.

## FORGER ROGERS DENIED PAROLE AT SAN QUENTIN

## FEDERALS RUSH TO BESEIGED CITY

DOUGLAS, Ariz., Oct. 10.—Two hundred and fifty Mexican federals are rushing to Montezuma, Sonora, today to relieve that town, which is surrounded and threatened by General Antonio Rojas and 400 insurgents. Rojas issued an ultimatum demanding that the federal garrison of the town surrender or be annihilated. There are only 100 federals at Montezuma, and it is feared they may be wiped out before reinforcements arrive. Two hundred additional federals were ordered to the scene. The federals have orders to pursue any advantage they may obtain over Rojas force, to the end of exterminating the rebels.

General Rojas has applied to President Madero for amnesty, but while awaiting a reply is losing no opportunity to lay waste to the country.

H. Cohen, commercial editor of the Oregon Journal. Eighty thousand acres were planted, but bumper outputs were the order despite blight in some sections.
