

## BOSTON'S WEAK POINT IS LACK OF GENERALSHIP

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—Seize from us (gentle or rough) reader, the wild scramble ever mixed upon a world's baseball series program is now an all-out effort. Before this pop-eyed series concludes there will be two baseball clubs fit for the booby hatch and two hundred thousand raving rooters running about in dizzy circles, pursued by an army of keepers fresh from the "bug house."

Of the battles up to date, the teams not only have broken even, but each hectic and nerve-shattering battle has gone to the final inning—the final pitch, the final out, where the frail margin of a hair might have won or lost all three contests. If there is any edge today, it belongs to the Giants. McGraw has Tesreau, Mathewson and Marquard left, while Boston has only Joe Wood. Collins, Hall and O'Brien failed to show what is technically called game-proof goods. Yet the Red Sox still carry two strong features. The Giants have shown an eager wish to crack at every close call, while Boston has displayed a dauntless spirit in the attack at the finish—a resolute courage in battling until the last man has died. This angle flashed brilliantly yesterday when only a miracle saved Rube Marquard, after working in one of the grandest games.

Boston's one weakness is lack of generalship—the team appears to be working in circles, with no central aim. In the fourth battle today, Tesreau and Wood will hook up before the greatest crowd witnessing a game. With even muddling weather, there will be 40,000 persons at the Polo Grounds and if the game breaks cracks and flashes as the others have done, there will be the wildest spasm of frenzy that ever tore the welkin into strips or rattled the beetling crags of Coogan's Bluff.

Both teams today want rain. A postponement means a fourth game Saturday before a bigger crowd than could be mustered today, and, consequently, more money for the players.

## NO ACTION TAKEN FOR NEW FISHWAY GOLD RAY DAM

Master Fish Warden Edward Clanton, in his quarterly report to the state fish and game commission, refers as follows to local conditions:

After considerable correspondence with the California-Oregon Power company with reference to the installation of an additional fishway over their Gold Ray dam, I was unable to get any results, and in order to get relief at the earliest possible moment I secured the services of an engineer who prepared plans and specifications for the proposed ladder on the south side of the river. These plans and specifications, with a notice from this office, was served upon the manager of the above company, demanding that the fishway be installed and in operation not later than November 1st. So far, no effort has been made to begin work, and should this company ignore the notice and refuse to construct the fishway, I would respectfully ask that I be instructed to start action against the company for its failure to provide the fishway.

Fish Culturist Wilson also made a close investigation of Rock Creek, in Klamath county, with a view of establishing a trout hatchery and, after selecting a suitable location, arrangements were made with Commissioner Stone for securing a plot, etc., thereof before taking any further action.

## CONNECT EUREKA AND COOS BAY

(Eureka Herald)  
That Eureka is positively to be connected with Portland and other Oregon points by rail in the very near future was established beyond question yesterday afternoon when deeds conveying rights-of-way owned by the Southern Pacific railroad company and embracing the territory lying between Downs Prairie and the Klamath river were conveyed to the Willamette-Pacific Railroad company recently organized. The conveyance, it is understood, is simply technical, the Willamette-Pacific company being simply a branch of the Southern Pacific railroad company.

In incorporation papers filed with the county clerk over a month ago, the purposes of the Willamette-Pacific company were set forth, no mention of the road down the coast being made. It is now evident, however, that the company is to do more

than construct several short lines in Oregon, the bridging of the gap between the northern terminus of the Northwestern Pacific in this county and Coos Bay being its fundamental object.

It has been generally acknowledged for some time past that although the Northwestern Pacific will obtain a substantial traffic as soon as it is opened to Eureka from the south, railroad logic would not permit Eureka to remain the perma-

nent northern terminus. The bridging of the gap to the north is contemplated, it is stated, even before the completion of the Panama canal in order that expected increased traffic at that time may be accommodated. The transfer of rights-of-way, as recorded yesterday, amply substantiates all former reports and stands as unimpeachable evidence that actual railroad construction work north of Eureka will be witnessed in the very near future.

## HALF OF FAMED NEGRO CONNECTED TWINS DEAD

WILMINGTON, N. C., Oct. 10.—With Millie, one of the famous negro twins, Millie-Christine, celebrated throughout the world, dead here today, the death of the other twin is expected within a few days. The twins, born during slavery days, had the same body but two heads and two pairs of extremities. After birth they were sold for \$40,000 for exhibition purposes, but were stolen from their owner a few years later and taken to Europe. They were highly educated and reputed to be wealthy.
