ONLY \$78,000,000 IN ASTOR ESTATE

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—That the estate of the late Colonel John Jacob Astor will appraise at many millions less than was supposed, is reported here today, following the deposit of a check for \$3,150,000 with the state controller at Albany, representing the transfer tax, computed on the present value of the estate. Previous estimates of the estate ranged from \$77,000,000 up to \$150,000,000, but the payment of the tax indicates that the fortune will not exceed \$78,000,000.
