CHICAGO, Oct. 15.—Governor Hiram Johnson, progressive candidate for vice president, telephoned from Cleveland today for the latest news from his running mate, Colonel Roosevelt. At the same time telegrams from all parts of the country began to pour in.

General Leonard Wood, chief of staff of the United States army, wired from Portland, Oregon: "Sympathy and congratulations."

From Benjamin Ide Wheeler, president of the University of California came this message: "We have been terribly shocked, but glory in your pluck and will love you always. Take a little care of yourself, for we cannot get along without you."

From Chester Rowell, Fresno, Cal.: "I am indescribably shocked at the dastardly attempt on your life. They have tried everything but even bullets cannot stop you."

From James J. Corbett, former heavyweight champion pugilist, who is convalescing from an appendicitis operation in Philadelphia, came the following: "Congratulations on your lucky escape. I sincerely hope you will be elected."

BRYAN AND BOB WIRE TO TEDDY

CHICAGO, Oct. 15.—Colonel Roosevelt was resting easily this afternoon, talking for a few minutes, with the newspaper correspondents. He said he felt fine.

Senator Robert M. LaFollette wired Colonel Roosevelt as follows: "Permit me to express my profound regret that your life should have been imperiled. I congratulate you upon your fortunate escape from serious injury. I trust you will speedily recover."

The following telegram was received from William J. Bryan: "Allow me to join your countrymen, irrespective of party, in deploring the murderous attack, and expressing profound gratification at the assurance that your wound is not serious."

TEAM PLUNGES OVER MOUNTAIN GRADE

OIL SHIP SINKS LUMBER SCHOONER

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 15.—Colliding with the steam schooner Argyle of the Union Oil Company's fleet, the lumber schooner Gualala, belonging to Fred Linderman of San Francisco, filled and capsized off Point Arena, north of here, early today. The crew was taken off and arrived here on the Gualala this afternoon.

Two men were injured, one of them, Peter Sotz, of San Francisco, receiving a broken wrist. The name and nature of the injuries of the other man were not stated in the brief wireless message flashed by the Argyle.

The Argyle, commanded by Captain Dickson, carries a crew of 36 men. The Gualala carried eighteen men and was commanded by Captain Martensen.
