

FAST PROGRAM AT FAIR GROUNDS

Thursday afternoon's program at the fair grounds promises plenty of action.

"Something doing at the time" is the slogan of the committee.

The program secured so far will include a half-mile trot in the harness racing division. This will be run in three half-mile heats, and between each heat the outlaw horses and wild bulls will have their inning.

Albia, owned by Dr. Helms and others; Lady Sunrise, owned by J. K. Ware, and David Harum, owned by Dr. Helms, make up the entry for the half-mile trot.

Three entries have been secured for the quarter-mile running race.

The committee, which is composed of Dr. Helms, Scott Wolf and Wig Ashpole, want to assure the public that this will not be a political meeting, but their feature event will be the presidential race. The entries for the presidential race are Pete Barnburg's Jersey bull named Bill Taft; Woodrow Wilson is a Jersey three-year-old owned by C. T. Payne of Phoenix; Eugene Debs is a cross owned by Ed Hanley; Teddy Roosevelt, the wildest and fiercest of the bunch, is a Holstein owned by Dr. Helms. Ashpole & Nichols have entered two heifers with very mean dispositions.

This race promises more excitement than the wild horse race, and was one of the features at the Pendleton round-up this year. At Pendleton the entry had but one bull and two heifers. Each rider will saddle his animal in front of the grandstand.

The county is being hunted for outlaw horses, and J. W. Murphy's horse Billy, who jumped the fence at Ashland, July 4, and Jim Lindsay's horse are the Ashland entries. Grey Diamond, owned by Gus Nichols of Eagle Point; Circle J., owned by Doc Helms; Stanley Vaughn's sorrel Billy, and two mares from the Howard ranch have been secured for this division. The committee expect to have many more horses for this event by this evening.

Miss Eaton of Jacksonville, Miss Chase from Oklahoma, Miss Norris of Butte, Mont., and Miss Smith of Medford will try for first honors in the ladies' relay race. Sixteen horses will be run in this event, which will be two miles, and each rider will change horses every half mile.

A pole team race and a mule race will complete the program.

The committee guarantees plenty of sport and no delays.

GREATER MEDFORD CLUB TO GIVE ELABORATE DANCE

MAUSOLEUM TO BE BUILT IN MEDFORD

Medford is to have a community mausoleum representing an investment of from \$75,000 to \$100,000, containing 350 to 500 tombs. It will be situated in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

George Cuthbert is now in the city making final arrangements and declares construction will begin in the near future. The structure will be built of reinforced concrete and stone with a marble interior by the Portland Mausoleum company under patents of the International Mausoleum company. Between 150 and 200 of these buildings will be constructed in the west, there being 100 now in progress of construction and promotion.

The exact size of the Medford building will depend upon the number of tombs subscribed for. Pictures of the proposed edifice are now on display at Kentner's and the Merriwood shop. G. L. Tretchler and L. W. Zimmer have the subscription for Medford, Ashland and vicinity.

The building will provide for family rooms containing 5 or 10 tombs affording an individual mausoleum in an endowed building. These mausoleums are endowed sufficiently to take care of the building for all time.

Senator L. L. H. Austin of the International Mausoleum company of Chicago will give a stereopticon lecture at the Natatorium on Friday evening, October 25 at 8 p. m. on mausoleums of the world. Senator Austin is well versed in this subject having made several trips abroad studying the question. The lecture will be free to all interested, in the great scientific departure in a matter that has had less attention than almost any other problem of the age and yet one of the most important. The senator delivered an address at Salem last Wednesday before an audience of 350 people.
