

FARE ON BARNUM ROAD IS BOOSTED

The fare to Jacksonville on the Rogue River Valley railroad has been boosted again to 25 cents each way. This has the last benefit of competition been wiped away and visitors to Jacksonville must again pay the old time rate of 50 cents for the round trip.

The 50 cent rate was the one in effect when an auto stage line between Medford and Jacksonville was instituted. Then to meet competition the fare was cut to 25 cents for the round trip.

Sometime ago the auto service was discontinued but an immediate boost in rates, though expected, did not come until now.

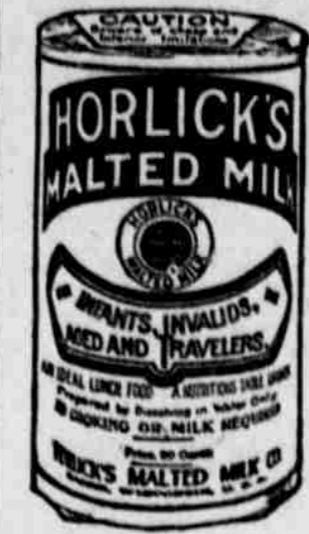
