**BULGARIANS CAPTURE FORTS**

VIENNA, Oct. 26.—The latest advices received here today from the Bulgarian front at Adrianople state that the outlying forts of Saffier, Havaras and Maras on the northeast of the city have been captured. The Turks, in position to the southeast of the city, are reported in retreat and the Bulgarians as advancing all along their line of battle.

The civilian population of Adrianople is reported to be deserting the city by thousands.

LONDON, Oct. 26.—Dispatches received tonight from Vranje, Servia, by the Exchange Telegraph say that the Servians have captured Uskub.

SOFIA, Oct. 26.—More than 1,000 Turkish prisoners arrived here today from Adrianople. They were received kindly and given medical attention. The burgomaster of Sofia supplied them all with cigarettes.

BELOGRADE, Oct. 26.—Reports received this evening that the Turks have abandoned Uskub and are concentrating further to the south.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 26.—It was officially announced here today that the Turks have won a great victory. No details were given and no indication where the conflict occurred.
