Death Blow to Loan Sharks. TACOMA, Wn., Nov. 1.—Aiming a death blow at the loan sharks who have been monthly drawing the salaries of city employees and charging them usurious interest on money advanced, the city council today agreed to pass a resolution to be introduced by Commissioner of Finance Freeland, creating a committee to be composed of himself, Mayor Seymour and City Clerk Edwards, and the establishment of a fund of \$5,000, from which money is to be advanced to city employees at 8 per cent a year.
