

GRUBERS ACTS AROUSES TEDDY

OYSTER BAY, N. Y., Nov. 4.— Learning that Abe Gruber one of the republican machine leaders of New York, had advised his followers to support Wilson "if they don't feel like voting the republican ticket," Colonel Roosevelt today issued a red-hot denunciation of Gruber, declaring his advice proves positively that there is an alliance of the New York republicans and democrats, as he has hitherto charged.

"Gruber's attitude," said Roosevelt, "illustrates anew what is shown by the conduct of Penrose, Barnes, Crane and the other republican bosses. They haven't the slightest expectation of winning and their sole purpose is to indirectly aid the democrats to beat the progressives. Financiers and bosses of this type are really non-partisan. If they can't keep control of their own party they consider it next best to put the democratic bosses in control."

Roosevelt speaks at Mineola this afternoon and tonight will wind up his campaign by an address here.

BOSTON, Nov. 4.—That the coming marriage of Mrs. Grover Cleveland and Professor Thomas J. Preston is perfectly satisfactory to him, is the statement here today of Richard Folseum Cleveland, son of the bride to be.

Young Cleveland, who is a student at Phillips Exeter Academy, declared he liked his prospective step-father very much.

EDITH BOOKER SCORES HEAVILY

The hall at the Nat Sunday evening was packed to overflowing when Rev. Edith Booker of St. Louis delivered her suffrage address. The speech was one of the ablest ever heard in Medford the speaker presenting her cause in a different light and scoring heavily with each point. Starting with the text "I commend to thee Phoebe, our sister," from St. Paul, Mrs. Booker took up Biblical and profane history to show the precedent for woman's right to an equal voice in government. Mrs. Booker speaks as one inspired and made a lasting impression.

ARIZONA CLAIMED BY SUFFRAGETTES

PHOENIX, Ariz., Nov. 4.—With complete organization in every county of the state suffrage leaders today declare that votes for women will carry at the polls tomorrow.

The strongest allies of suffrage for women in Arizona is the Western Federation of Miners, which is a power in state politics, controlling, it is believed, more than 4,000 votes.

All the party platforms favor equal suffrage for Arizona, but the democrats and republicans have made little effort to present the issue.

It is believed, however, with the aid of the federation of miners and the socialists, the suffrage measure will easily carry in this state.

Chairman William H. McCombs and William G. McAdoo have promised to make brief visits to democratic headquarters.

Senator Joseph M. Dixon, George Perkins, Governor Johnson and Frank A. Munsey will be at progressive headquarters here tomorrow night. Governor Johnson will make his last speech of the campaign at Springfield, Mass. tonight.

Miss Whisler Dies at Salem

Miss Sarah Whisler, sister of C. E. Whisler, of this city, died at Salem, Oregon, Friday night.

The remains were brought to Medford Sunday afternoon on train No. 15 and funeral services were held at the Odd Fellows cemetery immediately following the arrival of the train. Mr. Whisler, who accompanied the remains here, was met at the depot by a great number of the members of local lodge of Elks of this city and was accompanied to the cemetery by them.

SUFFRAGETTES SURE OF WINNING KANSAS

TOPEKA, Kans., Nov. 4.—That Kansas will fall in line with other states in giving the ballot to women was the confident prediction of suffrage leaders here today who assert that the amendment will be adopted by 30,000 majority. The suffragettes are well organized in all but eight counties of the state, and there will be an active worker stationed at all the polling places tomorrow.

The women workers, it was estimated today, had delivered 2000 speeches during the campaign, covering 14,000 miles of territory by automobile.

WILSON CERTAIN OF VICTORY IN OHIO

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Nov. 4.—The odds that Woodrow Wilson, democratic nominee for president will be elected range from one to ten here today and bets of ten to one are also being offered that James M. Cox, democrat, will be elected governor of Ohio.

Even money is offered that Taft will run second in Ohio and one bet was made at 16 to 1 that Taft would not be re-elected.

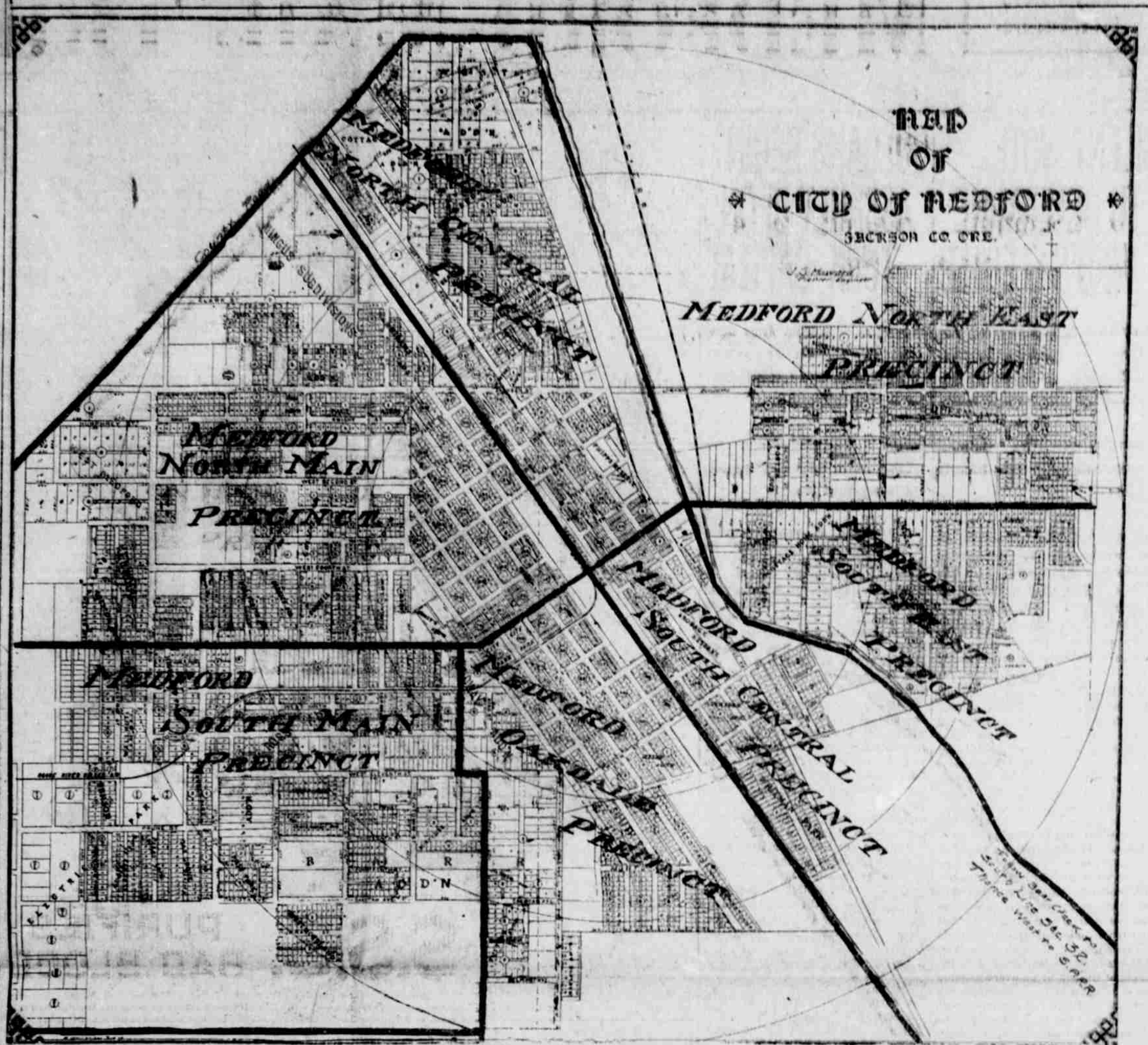
