

TOU VELLE ELECTED BY 500 PLURALITY

KELLY WINS BY OVER 1000; REAMES VICTOR

Medford Votes as Solidly for Tou Velle as Ashland Does for Dunn—Country Precincts Break About Even—Bourne Carries Jackson.

Singler Defeats Jones for Sheriff—Race for Representatives Very Close.

24 Precincts Complete

Twenty-four precincts out of 40 in Jackson county today with a completed count give the following result:

By a majority estimated to be between 300 and 500 votes Frank L. Tou Velle, democrat, was elected county judge Tuesday by the people of Jackson. Mr. Tou Velle proved very strong in Medford and the northern part of the county and found no difficulty in breaking even in the precincts where his opponent George W. Dunn was considered the stronger of the two.

The exact result of the contest will not be known until Thursday or Friday owing to the length of the ballot and the slowness in making the count.

Returns at noon today show that Tou Velle carried Gold Hill, Eagle Point, Butte Falls, Flourence Rock and Trail, and broke even in Jacksonville and other sections of the county. In Medford the vote was practically a unit for Mr. Tou Velle owing to the bitterness expressed toward this city

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LISTER ELECTED GOVERNOR OVER HAY AND HODGE

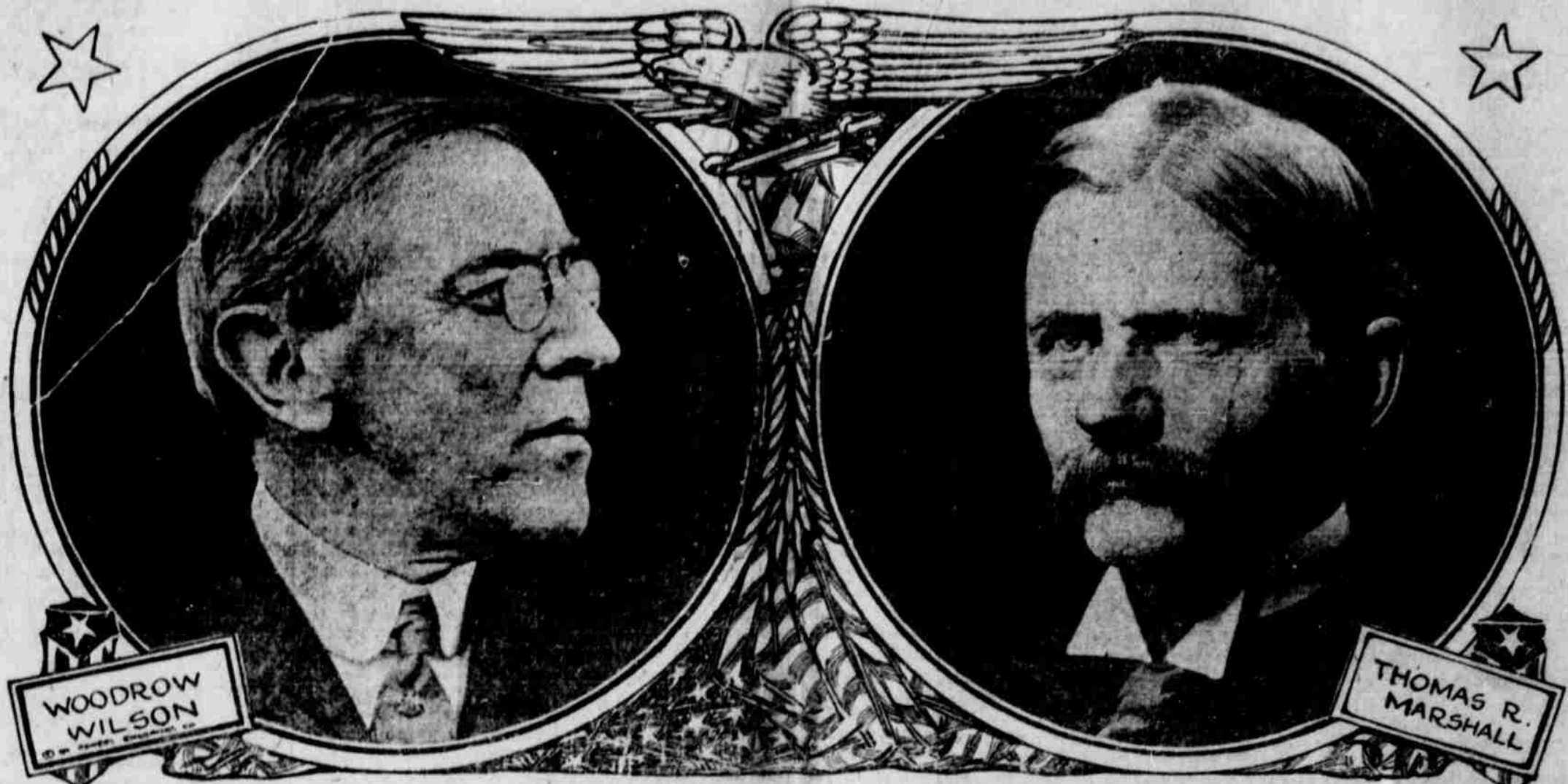
SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 6.—Although there is no definite or official figures to substantiate it, the indications are today that Ernest Lister, democrat, is elected governor by a margin of probably 5000 votes, with Hodge and Hay fighting neck and neck for second place.

The returns, officially and unofficially thus far counted, however, are no meager that no positive prediction can be made. Returns from the country districts and from Eastern Washington may change the apparent outcome.

The democrats generally voted their ticket straight and all candidates of the party are running close to Lister.

Forty-five complete precincts of King county give Lister 1698, Hay, 1460, Hodge 1303.

On the other hand, Hodge has apparently carried Snohomish, Kitsap and Thurston counties. The lead gained in the country may make him a contender with Lister for first place.



FOUR OUT OF FIVE STATES TO GIVE GIRLS VOTE

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Advocates of woman suffrage were delirious with joy today. Four out of five states carried yesterday for the amendments striking the word "male" out of the constitutions was considered sufficient cause, and it was stated that Saturday's parade up fashionable Fifth Avenue, to be participated in by thousands of men and women, representing every state in the union, would be a record-breaker.

One state—Wisconsin—rejected suffrage. Four approved—Arizona, Oregon, Kansas and Michigan—bringing the total of states where women have all the rights of men up to ten. It was agreed by the leaders that the real reason for the defeat of the suffrage amendment in Wisconsin was the fight made against the socialists, who made suffrage a preferred cause.

In addition, it was opposed by the liquor interests.

IOWA FOR WILSON BY SAFE PLURALITY

DES MOINES, Iowa, Nov. 6.—Returns indicated at noon that Wilson had carried the state for president and the lead of Clark, republican for governor, has been reduced.

The democrats claim the state for Wilson by 20,000. The progressives give no figures. The Daily Capital, republican standpat, and the Tribune, progressive, both say Wilson has won by from 3,000 to 6,000. Both republican papers claim the republican state ticket is elected.

The democrats have three congressmen, possibly four.

BUSINESS UNHURT SAYS J. J. HILL

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Democratic success will not have an adverse business effect, James J. Hill, railroad magnate, declared today.

"I feel better over the general outlook than I did before election," he said. "And attempt was made to bring about a political revolution, but the American people, while desiring a change, showed their good sense by repudiating revolutionary doctrines and sticking to sound principles and established methods of bringing about their wishes."

TURKS ROUTED BY BULGARIANS 40,000 TAKEN

PARIS, Nov. 6.—The Bulgarians completely routed the Turks at Techorla and Serai during the night, wounding or capturing 40,000 men. The dispatch read the road to Constantinople is now open. This presumably meant after Tehtaltaja is taken, which is not believed to be difficult now.

SOFIA, Nov. 6.—Bulgaria has not given a single thought to the re-establishment of peace with Turkey, declared President Danef, of the lower house of parliament, just back from an interview with Czar Ferdinand at the front. Ferdinand means to fight it out, said Danef, until a "certain object is accomplished, when the war will cease of itself."

The statement was interpreted as meaning that Ferdinand is determined to drive the Turks out of Europe.

BERGER DEFEATED FOR CONGRESS IN MILWAUKEE

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Nov. 6.—Although the socialist party ticket vote showed a general increase throughout the country, the socialist cause locally received a setback in the defeat of Victor L. Berger for re-election to congress by about 2,000.

In Schenectady, N. Y., another socialist stronghold, practically all the present office-holders of that party were defeated for re-election.

MONTANA 10,000 FOR WILSON TICKET

HELENA, Mont., Nov. 6.—Wilson's plurality in Montana will be between 8000 and 10,000. Walsh, democrat, for senator, Stewart, democrat for governor and the two congressional candidates—Stout and Evans—are all elected. Their plurality are only slightly under Wilson's. Dixon, progressive, for senator, ran second to Walsh.

BOURNE AND LANE RUN AHEAD OF SELLING

PORTLAND, Nov. 6.—Eleven precincts complete in Multnomah county give Bourne 332, Lane 322, Selling 266 for senator.

BUSINESS NEED HAVE NO TREMORS DECLARES WILSON

PRINCETON, N. J., Nov. 6.—President-Elect Woodrow Wilson dictated this afternoon the following statement to the newspapers:

"The result gives us the hope that the thoughtful voters of the nation may now at last unite to give the country freedom and enterprise and a government released from selfish and arrogant influences, and one devoted to justice and progress.

"There is absolutely nothing for the honest and enlightened business man of the country to fear. No man whose business is conducted without violation of the rights of free competition and without such private understanding or secret alliances as violate the principle of our law and the policy of all wholesome commerce and enterprise, need fear either interference or embarrassment from the administration.

"Our hope and purpose is to bring all the free forces of the nation into active and intelligent co-operation and to give to our prosperity a freshness and spirit and a confidence such as it has not had in our time.

"The responsibility of the past is tremendous, but the responsibility is a common responsibility which all leaders must share. And, with the confidence of the people behind us, everything that is right is possible.

"My own ambition will be more than satisfied if I may be permitted to be the frank spokesman of the nation's thought in these great matters."

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—"So far as the influence of politics upon the stock market for the next few months is concerned," said Financial America today, "it is suggested that it will depend very largely upon the attitude taken by Wall Street as the probability of radical measures being enacted.

"If it is assured that President Wilson and his associates will pursue a conservative policy in the revision of the tariff and in dealing with other important measures, it is expected, of course that the market will be materially strengthened."

RAID ON KANSAS STANDARD OIL STOCK

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—A raid on Standard Oil of Kansas stock because of disappointment in regard to the recent dividend declaration was an early market feature today. The stock broke from 370 to 275, rallying later to 292.

The stock market closed strong.

UPWARD TREND UNCHECKED BY ELECTION RESULTS

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—The Wall Street Journal in its ticker service said today:

"The consensus of opinion in business circles is that the election of Woodrow Wilson will not check the upward trend of business. One of his efforts while in office will be to effect a readjustment of the tariff, but it is not believed he will go about it in such a way as to destroy confidence."

WISCONSIN FOR WILSON BY 25,000 PLURALITY

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Nov. 6.—At 3 p. m. complete and partial returns from about half of the counties in Wisconsin gave Karel, democrat, for governor 86,886; McGovern 75,758.

Wilson's strength was apparent in the late returns indicating his plurality will be at least 25,000.

At 1 o'clock today 942 precincts in the state showed for governor: "Karel, democrat 96,679; McGovern 83,782. This gives Karel a lead of 12,000 and his managers at that hour claimed his election.

DUNN IS ELECTED GOVERNOR OF ILLINOIS

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—In the midst of his family for almost the first time since the beginning of the campaign, Governor-Elect Edward F. Dunne, was honorary guest at a strictly private celebration today. The successful candidate spent the entire day at home with his wife and children.

Mrs. Dunne declared the idea of being the "first lady of the state" had no allurements for her.

"The executive mansion may be fine," she said, "but this is home."

ROOSEVELT CARRIES CITY OF RIVERSIDE CALIFORNIA

RIVERSIDE, Cal., Nov. 6.—Complete returns from Riverside City give Roosevelt 3,849; Wilson 1,238; Debs 51; Chafin 296. Taft 49.

Riverside county, which is usually one of the last counties to complete its count, the bull moose leaders claim will add 2,500 to Roosevelt's plurality south of the Tehachapi.

DIXON CLAIMS PROGRESSIVES NOW SUPPLANT G. O. P.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Senator Joseph M. Dixon, national progressive chairman, said today:

"The national progressive party takes its place as the dominant opposition party to the triumphant democratic party. As the result of the balloting yesterday the progressive party takes either first or second place in the balloting except in five states. In every state in the union except these five the progressive party organization from this time on takes the official minority party representation on all election boards, in all state boards and boards of control.

In the congressional elections, two years from this time, from every state except five, all judges of elections, watchers, inspectors and election boards will be controlled jointly by the progressives and the democrats. The old republican organization has become the third party in the United States. I doubt if it can ever muster enough to nominate a candidate for president.

"The progressive party has polled more than 4,000,000 votes. We will go forward immediately with our work of complete organization, looking to the control of the house of representatives two years from this time."

In a telegram congratulating state progressive chairmen and others Senator Dixon claimed 115 electoral votes for Roosevelt. He based the claim on Illinois, Michigan, Kansas, Pennsylvania, South Dakota and Washington. Terming California and Iowa in doubt, Dixon gave Taft Utah, Vermont and Idaho, totalling 12 electoral votes.

TURKS SURRENDER LAST SERVIAN TOWN

BELGRADE, Nov. 6.—Novoarosh, the last town still held by the Turks in Novipazar, has surrendered to the Servians. It was officially stated here today.

The anti-foreign situation in Constantinople is more threatening today, and it was said all Christians who could do so were leaving the city by boat.

HODGE CATCHING UP WITH LISTER IN COUNTRY

TACOMA, Wn., Nov. 6.—Complete returns from Puyallup and Buckley and one other country precinct have put Hodge within 75 votes of Lister in Pierce county. Thirty-eight out of 151 precincts are now in.

LANDSLIDE FOR DEMOCRATS IN ENTIRE NATION

Democratic Candidates Get 399 Electoral Votes With Probability of Still Others—Roosevelt Has 121 and Taft Only 20.

Wins All of New England Except Vermont, All of Coast Except State of Washington.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Further gains for Wilson were recorded as the belated returns came in today, and this gives Wilson 399 electoral votes. In addition there was a strong trend for Wilson in Illinois.

During the day Rhode Island and New Hampshire were shifted from the Taft column to Wilson, giving Wilson a clean sweep in New England with the exception of Vermont, which went for Taft.

Colonel Roosevelt was definitely credited with 112 electoral votes but his managers insisted that he would also have the five votes of South Dakota, as yet credited to Taft.

The democrats claimed Wyoming but the figures were not yet conclusive, and Wyoming remained in the Taft column, Taft being credited with 20 electoral votes. Wilson has carried the following 37 states:

Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Indiana, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Maine, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, West Virginia, Wisconsin.

Roosevelt was credited with: Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Pennsylvania and Washington.

Taft was credited with: Idaho, South Dakota, Utah, Vermont and Wyoming.

Estimates on the popular vote were still very vague, but it was asserted by both progressives and republicans that Wilson would not have a majority over both Taft and Roosevelt.

LATEST FIGURES PUT CALIFORNIA RESULT IN DOUBT

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 6.—Despite confident claims by the democrats of a Wilson majority ranging from 7000 to 20,000 and practical concession by progressives that the state is lost, all indications this afternoon are that the result as between Roosevelt and Wilson is still in doubt and that if California does go into the democratic column it will be by a comparatively small plurality.

South of the Tehachapi mountains late returns indicate that Roosevelt's plurality is slowly creeping up toward what was expected. It will not reach that point and full knowledge of its extent probably will not be available today but enough is known to show that his defeat by anything like the democratic claim is more than doubtful.

Wilson's strength north of the mountains does not seem, in the light of late returns, to be up to earlier expectations. San Francisco gives him about 11,000 plurality but returns from the extreme north upstate indicate the probable election of Congressman Kent, practically a progressive and Wilson's lead may be cut down there.

The most that probably will be known of California before night is very likely to fall to settle finally in whose column the state will fall.
