LANDSLIDE FOR WOODROW WILSON THROUGH NATION

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Woodrow Wilson, democrat, swept the country yesterday.

Returns early today showed that the predictions that the democratic party would be put in control in the nation were well founded. A popular as well as electoral plurality was insured for Wilson by a united party in every state of the union. He carried 32 states with a total vote in the electoral college of 354 out of 451 votes. He carried his own state of New Jersey. He wrested from President Taft his native state of Ohio and from Colonel Roosevelt his home commonwealth of New York.

Not alone that, but for the first time since the organization of the republican party a democrat will get the electoral vote of Maine.

Wilson goes into office with a heavy congress behind him and assurances that the next senate will be made up of his party faith. He will be able to force through the measures to which he is pledged.

Wilson carried with him to victory democratic senators and congressmen everywhere. He carried through enough members of legislatures to insure the retirement of Senator Briggs to private life and the elevation to the senate of former Congressman William Hughes, in whose behalf Wilson stumped the state during the last few days.

Wilson carried the following states, all of which were carried by Bryan four years ago: Alabama, Kentucky, Nebraska, South Carolina, Arkansas, Louisiana, Nevada, Tennessee, Florida, Maryland, North Carolina, Texas, Georgia, Mississippi, Oklahoma and Virginia.

In addition he took from Mr. Taft the following states which the president carried four years ago: Connecticut, Delaware, Indiana, Maine, Massachusetts, Montana, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, South Dakota, West Virginia and Wisconsin.

He also carried Arizona and New Mexico, territories four years ago. He was leading in and it was claimed, had carried Iowa and California.

UNCLE JOE CANON CONCEDES HIS DEFEAT

DANVILLE, Ill., Nov. 6.—E. X. Lescurve, son-in-law and campaign manager of "Uncle Joe" Cannon, today conceded the defeat of the former speaker of the house. Cannon declined to make a statement.

Democratic campaign managers claim Edgar county for O'Hair, democrat, by 1,100; Clark by 224; Cumberland by 500 and Iroquois by 300. This brings O'Hair into the northern part of the district with 2100 votes to spare.

Cannon's managers claim Kankakee county by 800 and Vermillion by 600, leaving O'Hair winner by about 700.

Estimates by the canvassing board give Cannon Vermillion county by 1,000 and Kankakee by 800. O'Hair, democrat, takes Edgar county by 1,100; Clark by 300 and Cumberland by 400, with Iroquois county in doubt. An official canvass likely will be required to decide the election in this district.

"Uncle Joe" Cannon has expressed the belief privately that he will be returned to congress by a majority of from 100 to 200.

TAFT CONGRATULATES WILSON AND PRAISES SECY. HILLES

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Nov. 6.—Taft last night sent this message to his successor in the presidency: "Hon. Woodrow Wilson, Princeton, N. J., I cordially congratulate you on your election and extend to you my best wishes for a successful administration. (Signed) "WILLIAM HOWARD TAFT."

Taft also sent this telegram to Charles D. Hilles, chairman of the republican national committee, who with Mrs. Taft, received the election returns at the Times building, New York City: "You have conducted a most difficult campaign in the face of unusual obstacles. I congratulate you heartily on the fight you have made and am deeply grateful to you for it. (Signed) "WILLIAM HOWARD TAFT."

SENATOR J. L. WILSON OF WASHINGTON DEAD

SEATTLE, Wn., Nov. 6.—Former United States Senator John L. Wilson of this state, died suddenly in a hotel at Washington, D. C. according to a message received this morning by the Seattle Post Intelligencer, a newspaper owned by him. Heart disease was the cause. Senator Wilson had toured some of the eastern states, speaking for President Taft. He spent election day in Washington, and was on his way with his family to visit the Panama canal when death came.

WILSON REPLIES TO CONGRATULATORY WIRES

PRINCETON, N. J., Nov. 6.—Governor Wilson, shortly after noon, replied to telegrams from President Taft and Colonel Roosevelt. To President Taft he telegraphed: "I warmly appreciate your kind message, and will extend my sincere personal regard."

To Colonel Roosevelt, he said: "My sincere thanks for your kind message. Pray accept my cordial good wishes."

STUBBS ELECTED BY KANSAS TO SENATE

TOPEKA, Kan., Nov. 6.—More complete returns from Kansas this afternoon show that Roosevelt has a lead 20,000 and has the state safely in his column. Governor Stubbs, republican candidate for the United States senate and the entire republican state ticket will have 20,000 plurality.

KNOWLAND RE-ELECTED BY OAKLAND TO CONGRESS

OAKLAND, Cal., Nov. 6.—Returns from 254 precincts out of 287 in Alameda county show that Congressman Joseph R. Knowland defeated J. Stitt Wilson, the socialist mayor of Berkeley, for congress by a vote of 28,010 to 20,604. It is estimated that Knowland's majority over Wilson will be about 8,000.

HILLES DECLARES G. O. P. IS NOT BUSTED

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Chairman Charles D. Hilles of the republican national committee in a statement issued tonight, declared that the change in administration was only temporary and that the republicans would regain control of the country in 1916. He eulogized President Taft and declared that his administration was one of the best in the country's history. His defeat, Hilles said, was due entirely to Colonel Roosevelt.

MRS. TAFT AND MISS TAFT SMILE AS NEWS IS RECEIVED

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Mrs. Taft and Miss Helen Taft, with a party of friends, listened to the election returns on the eleventh floor of the Manhattan hotel. Both were in a pleasant humor and seemed to take the result as a matter of course. Neither Mrs. Taft nor Miss Taft would comment on the outcome.

Believes Socialism Successful

To the editor of the Tribune: The writer holds no brief for the socialist party as an exponent of its principles, or as a "defender of the Faith." However, being thoroughly convinced that socialist economics are sound, and are of the truest ethical type, he feels constrained to defend his belief.

In your issue of Nov. 2nd, is a communication: "How Socialism Works Out," intended by way of criticism or attack on socialism. Its writer evidently holds that the French revolution was a practical exemplification of socialism. A careful reading of history and study of the principles of socialism will thoroughly disprove such an idea. Socialism is an economic theory which has never been given practical trial. Your correspondent believes it will be given practical trial, and prove successful when the people of any government become sufficiently enlightened to become widely imbued with the spirit of justice, fraternity and true charity; when a sufficient number of individuals recognize that the general material welfare of society should be the prime consideration of government in its relation to industrial and economic questions, then socialism will be tried, and under such realization should prove successful. He also believes socialism will come as the result of evolution, that it cannot be forced on society or put in operation before the people are ready for it.

Socialistic ideas are growing rapidly under pressure of existing inequitable economic conditions affecting the people in their physical life; while on the intellectual and moral side, the ideas and ethics of socialism are advanced as the result of increase in scientific knowledge and general reading of scientific literature. Socialism proposes building a new social order from the foundation up. The workers are the foundation of the social structure, and by improvement of their condition the socialist predicates a new and better civilization. The basic idea of socialism is ownership and control of industry by the workers—so they may become masters of their means of producing a livelihood, instead of being, as at present, "wage slaves," their means of life owned and subject to the caprice of, and their labor exploited for the profit of the private owners of industry. The socialist party is the political expression of this working class.

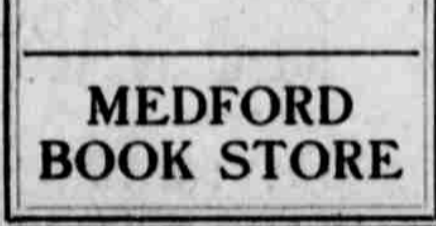
