

OREGON GIVES WILSON LEAD RESULT CLOSE

Lane Leads With Selling Second in Senatorial Race With Bourne Trailing—Lafferty Re-elected to Congress From Portland.

Returns from County Districts Slow Owing to Length of Ballot Voted Upon.

PORTLAND, Nov. 6.—According to a compilation of state returns at 12:30 p. m., A. W. Lafferty is re-elected to congress; Ben Olcott is an easy winner for secretary of state; John D. Mickle elected state dairy and food inspector; Clyde Aitchison re-elected railroad commissioner; Robert Eakin re-elected supreme justice; N. J. Sinnott elected to congress from the second district and W. C. Hawley to the first district.

Harry Lane, democrat, and Ben Selling, republican, are still fighting for the senatorship. Jonathan Bourne present incumbent, is hopelessly out of the running.

The presidential result is still in doubt with indications that Wilson will have a slight lead over Roosevelt. The colonel is running strong in many districts, however, and progressive leaders now claiming Oregon. "We are not willing to concede Oregon to Wilson," declared L. M. Lepper, secretary of the Roosevelt progressive state central committee. "We believe this state will be found in the bull moose party column."

Returns still are lagging on account of the cumbersome ballot, with state wide indications that women's suffrage carried, and capital punishment retained.

Single tax for Multnomah county is already doomed.

PROGRESSIVES HOLD COUNCIL OF WAR

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Bull moose leaders held a war council at progressive national headquarters today, and then sent Governor Johnson of California, defeated candidate for vice president, and Gifford Pinchot to see Colonel Roosevelt at Oyster Bay. Senator Dixon, national chairman and George W. Perkins attended the conference. Governor Johnson today declined further comment on the returns.

"I am going back to California to go to work," he said.

He plans to return from Oyster Bay this afternoon and leave for the coast at 4 o'clock.

Despite defeat, Senator Dixon fairly oozed optimism and enthusiasm today.

SUFFRAGETTES CLAIM VICTORY IN MICHIGAN

DETROIT, Mich., Nov. 6.—For the first time in the count the vote on the woman suffrage amendment showed against votes for women this afternoon. Upwards of 400 precincts in the state totalled: Yes 51,916; No 52,153.

The suffragettes were still confident of victory on later returns.

KANSAS MAY JOIN DEMOCRATIC COLUMN

TOPEKA, Kans., Nov. 6.—Complete returns being received this afternoon show that the race between Roosevelt and Wilson is very close and the early indications on the incomplete returns of a walk-away for the colonel are entirely upset. Roosevelt was leading in 478 complete precincts by only 1,854 and the democrats are claiming the state.

Billy Kent Re-elected SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 6.—Belated returns received here today from Humboldt indicate that William Kent, independent progressive, has been re-elected to congress in the first district. Until these returns were received, the result remained in doubt, Kent and Judge Zumwalt, democrat, running neck and neck.

SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA IN LINE FOR TEDDY

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 6.—Three hundred and forty-four complete precincts in Los Angeles county give Roosevelt, 26,499; Wilson, 24,795; Debs, 19,450; Chaffin, 2054; Taft, 860.

This is a gain for Roosevelt over the earlier returns.

The race between Bell, republican, and Ralph Criswell, socialist for congress in the ninth district, is attracting great interest. Bell has a slight lead but the count is very incomplete.

Incomplete returns indicate that the racetrack gambling bill has been defeated in Los Angeles 2 to 1. The free textbook amendment won a sweeping victory.

BRYAN CONGRATULATES WILSON ON VICTORY

PRINCETON, N. J., Nov. 6.—Wilson said at noon that he had not formed any definite plans for the near future.

"I will be here the rest of the week," he said, "but after that I have made no arrangements."

Asked if he would call a special session of congress to meet immediately after March 4, Governor Wilson said:

"I have given no thought to matters of that character. I am not on a hair trigger."

A telegram was received from William J. Bryan today as follows: "You have carried my state, my city and my election district. Your success here adds to my joy in your national victory."

PROGRESSIVES CONTROL CALIFORNIA LEGISLATURE

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 6.—Indications throughout the state today are that Governor Hiram Johnson will retain a friendly legislature, complete returns from San Francisco, showing six of the eight republican assemblymen elected in the progressive column.

Five democratic assemblymen go to Sacramento this year.

Three of the eight republicans are re-elected incumbents who have already aided Governor Johnson in putting through his progressive legislation.

DYNAMITE CONSPIRACY TRIAL IS RESUMED

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 6.—The dynamite conspiracy trial after one day to allow the jurors to vote, was resumed today with the reading of more letters alleged by the government to have been written by the defendants to John J. McNamara and Frank M. Ryan. No letters that District Attorney Miller did not refer to in his opening statement were read.

O'GARA TO SPEAK TO STATE SOCIETY
