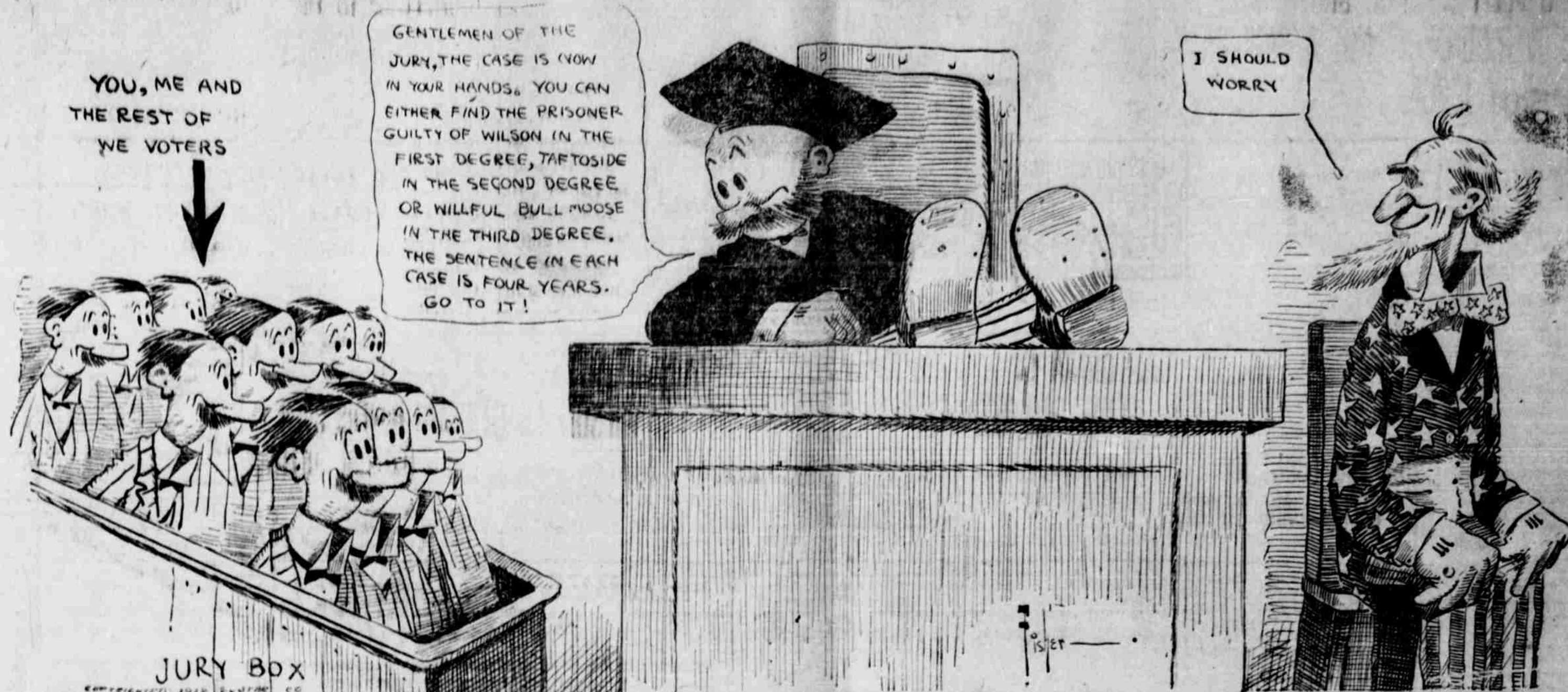

McMANIGAL TESTIFIES SENT WIFE SOUVENIR SPOONS AFTER SUCCESSFUL JOBS

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 11.—A graphic story of how he caused the explosions, how he carried the dynamite in suit cases on passenger trains and checked the explosive at railway stations without thought of danger to others; how he waited to place bombs so that the night watchmen would not see him, and how from every city where he blew up a "job" he sent a souvenir spoon to his wife in Chicago, were related by Orto McManigal on the witness stand in the trial of the forty-five accused "dynamite plotters."
He named Herbert S. Hockin, Frank C. Webb and Michael J. Young of Boston, Richard P. Houlihan of Chicago, James Conroy of Chicago and Frank M. Ryan, all officials of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers, besides the McNamara brothers, as the men who knew he was employed as a dynamiter.
Young and Webb actually pointed out the nonunion jobs for him to blow up and he said Hockin, now secretary of the union, was chief of the McNamara dynamiting crew, and said Ryan, president of the union, had spoken to him about an explosion.

McManigal is a confessed accomplice of the McNamara brothers, now in prison in California, and appeared as chief witness for the government to substantiate its charges that the men now on trial illegally transported dynamite on passenger train in connection with a series of explosions which included the Los Angeles Times disaster.

ENGLISH JOURNALS PRAISE WOODROW WILSON

LONDON, Nov. 11.—The evening newspapers today speak very highly of Woodrow Wilson and of his policies. The free trade Westminster Gazette says:
"The people of the United States are clearly ripe for new men and new measures," and adds that the Ameri-

can people are "tired of their professional politicians."
"Most heartily we wish success to this experiment with a 'philosopher king' being made in the most unlikely quarter of the world," it continues.
Theodore Roosevelt's position in the poll, according to the Westminster Gazette, justifies his incursion into the arena, while President Taft will get sympathy owing to the circumstances which set him up as the candidate of a divided party and with the strongest single personality in the country disputing his claim.
