

302 TOU VELLE'S LEAD OVER DUNN COUNTY JUDGE

The county clerk Monday morning completed the official count of the ballots cast in the recent general election as far as officials are concerned and is now completing the vote on amendments. The count on the laws will not be finished until late tonight or Tuesday.

The official lead of Frank L. Tou Velle over George W. Dunn is 302 votes, Tou Velle receiving 2603, Dunn 2301 and Brees, socialist, 344. The official count reduced John H. Carlin's lead over Mose Barkdoll for representative to only 10 votes. J. A. Westerlund was high with 1931, Carlin 1805, Barkdoll 1795, and DeArmond 1712.

OFFICIAL COUNT TO DECIDE IDAHO STATUS

BOISE, Idaho, Nov. 11.—It will take the official count to decide the final status of Idaho's four electoral votes. There is a strong indication of the vote being split, although returns to date, if the ratio is maintained, would give Wilson a lead of approximately 500. Roosevelt carried Boise and Ada counties by a big majority.

The entire republican state ticket was elected, John M. Haines being assured of the governorship despite the fact that he ran way behind his ticket. His plurality over Hawley, incumbent, will be about 1,000.

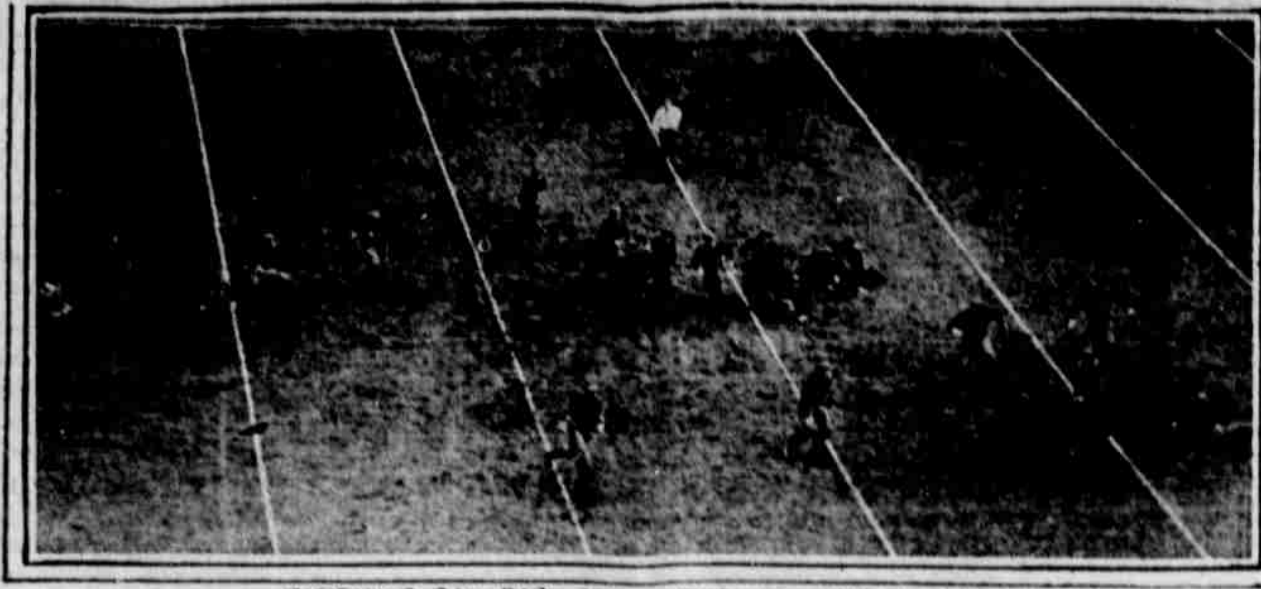

SCAFFOLD IS UP FOR HANGING BEE

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 11.—The scaffold at the state penitentiary is being put in readiness for the fateful day of Friday, December 13, when five men are doomed to be hanged.

Throughout the suspense after election day these five and the two Humphrey brothers, who are also condemned, but who have appealed, showed the intensity of feeling which gripped them, but Superintendent Curtis says they kept up their spirits with hope that the verdict of the people would be "thumbs up."

That the abolishment measure was lost was known to them as soon as the rest of the state as they had access to the daily papers.

DEATH HOVERS OVER BIG TIM SULLIVAN

Sullivan was elected to congress last week although he was not inside his district once during the entire campaign. The usual rally Saturday night before election was held without him.
