FEDERATION PLANS TO UNIONIZE STEEL TRUST

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Nov. 12.—Unionization of Los Angeles, the poorest organized city in the United States from a labor standpoint, occupied the attention of the delegates to the convention of the American Federation of Labor here today. Other questions under consideration were the unionizing of the plants of the United States Steel corporation and a continuation of the struggle to unionize the metal trades on the Pacific coast, and whether the federation will go directly into politics to attain its ends.

The delegates will also consider methods to be used in dealing with the Industrial Workers of the World where the two organizations clash.

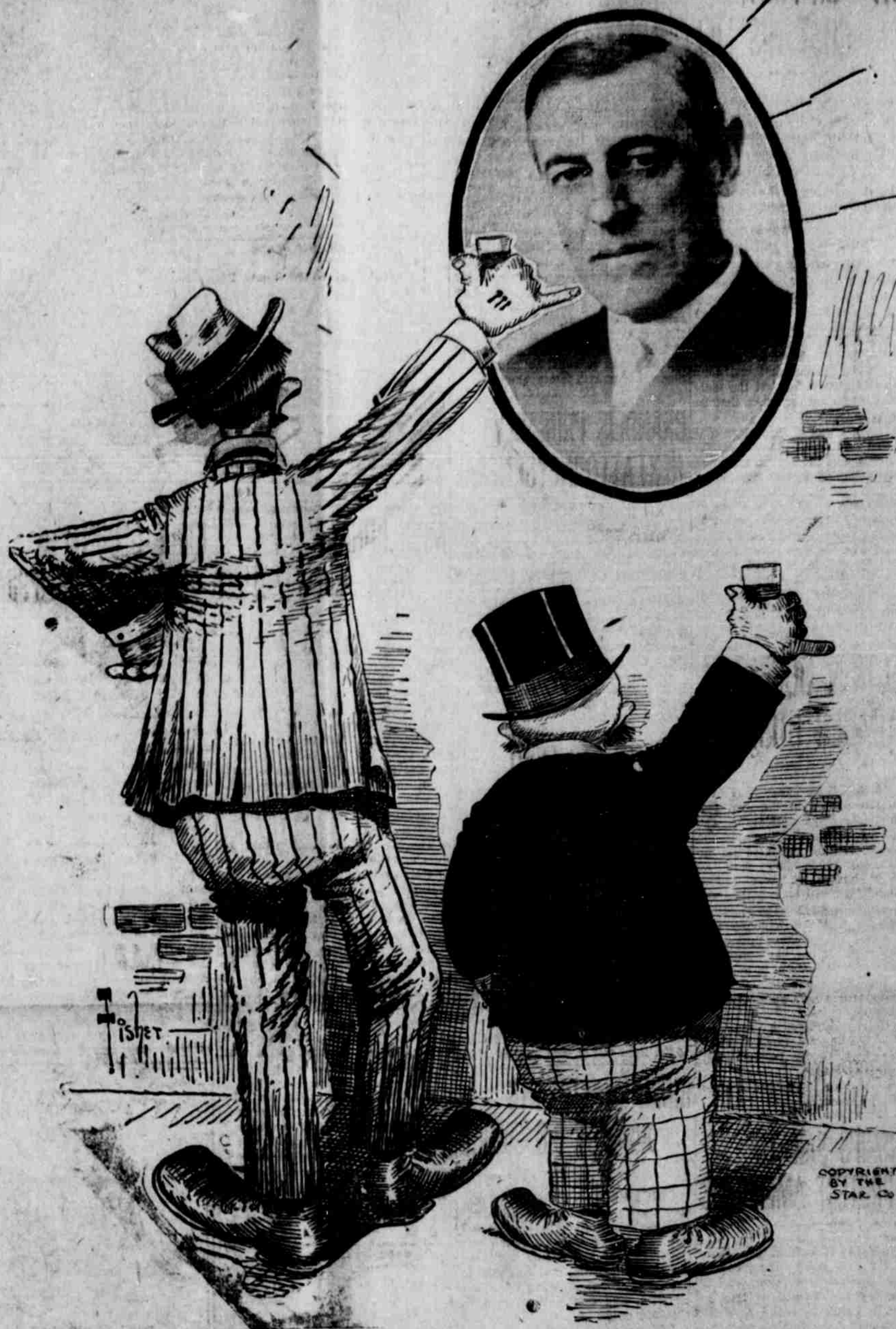
