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## DANGER GENERAL EUROPEAN WAR ENDED

### WAR IS OVER; POWERS AGREE UPON DIVISION

Russia Overawed by Display of Strength by Germany and Austria on Their Frontiers—Balkan Allies to Be Cheated of Part of Spoils.

Bulgaria to Have Rumelia and Eastern Macedonia—Serbia to Get a Port.

SOPIA, Nov. 14.—Turkey's request for a cessation of hostilities during the progress of peace negotiations is under consideration by the Bulgarian cabinet here today.

BERLIN, Nov. 14.—With Russia overawed by a display of strength by Germany and Austria on their frontiers, diplomats here today believe that the danger of a general European clash is ended.

**Balkans Lose Spoils**  
If this proves true the Balkan allies probably will not get as much of Turkey-in-Europe as they expected.

Montenegro, it is declared, will get ten or fifteen miles more of sea coast and some of the territory south of Lake Scutari, while Greece will secure control of a number of towns north of her present frontier.

**Albania Independent**  
Under the arrangement planned, Albania probably will be transformed into a semi-independent kingdom under nominal Turkish sovereignty.

Through the Neue Freie Presse, the Albanian National association appealed today for aid, accusing the Servians of atrocities in their country worse than any ever perpetrated by Turkey.

### HAY STILL CLINGS TO FORLORN HOPE

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 14.—That there is an organized attempt to count him out is the direct statement made today by Ernest Lister, Democratic candidate for governor who, on the face of unofficial returns, appears to have been elected by a narrow margin over M. E. Hay, republican, the incumbent.

This charge is made following the activity of members of the state tax commission and of the state bureau of accountancy throughout the state, all of whom are Hay's appointees, in going over the unofficial returns as "discovering" occasions which favor Hay and continue to reduce Lister's plurality.

According to the unofficial returns at hand today Lister received 97,136 votes, Hay, 96,610 and Hodge, progressive, 79,843. Ten scattered precincts are still unreported.

### GRAND VIZIER OF TURKEY ASKS CZAR FOR PEACE

Cholera Spreading at an Alarming Rate at Constantinople—Sanitary Conditions Fearful—Peace or Continued War Up to Czar Ferdinand.

Death of News Indicates That Allies Are Not Forcing Fighting—Rumors of Armistice.

VIENNA, Nov. 14.—Confirmation reached here today of the report that Kiamil Pasha, grand vizier of Turkey, has made a direct appeal for peace to Czar Ferdinand of Bulgaria.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 14.—Cholera is spreading in the city at an alarming rate. Four hundred deaths occurred in one army camp yesterday. Foreign residents are taking every possible precaution, but the sanitary condition of the city is so bad that a terrible outbreak of the disease is feared.

**Up to Ferdinand**

LONDON, Nov. 14.—Peace or continued war in the Balkans is believed today by diplomats here to hinge on the attitude of Czar Ferdinand of Bulgaria in regard to the entering Constantinople. If the Bulgarian army does not enter the Moslem capital, it is believed the war will speedily end and that Turkey will grant all the concessions demanded by the allies.

Czar Ferdinand, however, is characterized as the most ambitious ruler in Europe and it is possible that he may persist in carrying on the attack until the Sultan and his troops are driven from that city. It is considered certain here that the powers will not permit the Turks to be driven entirely from Europe, and it is pointed out that even if Ferdinand does accomplish the fall of Constantinople, his efforts will have been in vain.

**Eight Days Armistice**  
No confirmation has reached here of reports that fighting along the Tchatalja fortifications has ceased, and that an eight days' armistice has been signed. These reports, however, are credited in some quarters.

Reports received from Constantinople say the war is virtually over, but confirmation of this statement from Bulgarian sources is lacking.

As an indication of what the demands of the Balkan States will be, the London Daily Chronicle says it learns that Bulgaria hopes to obtain all the territory which she has conquered, including Thrace and a line of seaboard on the Aegean Sea, extending probably from Seres to Rodosto, leaving to the Turks Constantinople and the peninsula between Rodosto

and Midia, on the Black Sea. The scheme for Serbia is that she obtain a strip of territory along the valley of the Vardar to Macedonia, including the greater part of Macedonia, special provisions to be made with regard to the commercial rights of Austria in Salonica. The allies want the northern frontiers of Greece to be extended to join the Aegean territory at some point not far from Salonica, taking

in part Albania. To Montenegro would be allotted Scutari. No definite understanding has been arrived at with regard to the destiny of Albania. Presumably the Sanjak of Novibazar would revert to Austria. Rumania expects a reward for her neutrality in the form of a slice of territory between Silistria and the Black Sea, north of Varna. Russia, of course, expects to see the Dardanelles free.

### JAIL SENTENCE FOR PERJURY IN JOHNSON CASE

CHICAGO, Nov. 14.—A year's jail sentence for perjury was given Albert Jones by United States Judge Landis here today for attempting to furnish bail for Jack Johnson, the negro prizefighter, on property belonging to his wife and which he said was his own.

Attorney W. G. Anderson, a negro, representing Johnson, declared this afternoon that he has bonds which he believes will prove acceptable to the court. Johnson's mother and a white man, whose identity has not been disclosed are ready, Anderson said, to sign the bonds.

Judge Landis refused Jones a jury trial, and the latter appealed from the decision. The defendant was also

### TAFT SURPRISED AT STRENGTH OF ROOSEVELT VOTE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—"I was extremely hopeful that the result would be different. I was surprised at the strength shown by Colonel Roosevelt."

Thus declared President Taft here today in discussing the result of the presidential election. He added: "I had hoped we would pull through but was not in a condition of mind to be greatly disappointed by defeat.

### GOMPERS CERTAIN OF RELECTION AS FEDERATION CHIEF

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Nov. 14.—All indications pointed today to the re-election of Samuel Gompers as president of the American Federation of Labor, despite efforts of the socialistic element to sweep him from office.

Although the socialists have not perfected their plans, it seemed certain today that Duncan McDonald, an Illinois mine worker, would be named to oppose Gompers. Eugene Brays, a socialist, and general secretary of the Journeymen Tailors' union, probably will be selected to oppose Treasurer Lennon.

### GYP THE BLOOD SAYS STRANGER DID SHOOTING

Harry Horowitz Denies That He or Other Three Gunmen Shot Rosenthal, But Admits That He Was Near Scene of Crime at Time.

Did Not Know Gambler Was Dead Until He Read About It in the Papers Next Day.

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—Taking the stand in his own behalf, Harry Horowitz, alias "Gyp the Blood," on trial here, with three other gunmen for the alleged actual killing of Gambler Herman Rosenthal, denied today that he or any of the other defendants shot Rosenthal. The witness admitted that he was near the scene of the crime, but insisted that a "strange" man did the shooting.

Horowitz declared that he and the other defendants met the stranger earlier in the day at a bridge whist game in "Bridgey" Webber's poker rooms. The shooting of Rosenthal, he said, was sudden, with Webber and Harry Vallon joining in the fusillade. The witness said he met Webber, Vallon, Rose, Sam Schepps and the stranger only a short time before the shooting.

### PRICES FLY UPWARD ON STOCK MARKET

**LARS ANDERSON NAMED  
AMBASSADOR TO JAPAN**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—The appointment of Lars Anderson, at present United States minister to Belgium, as ambassador to Japan, succeeding Charles Page Bryan, resigned, was officially announced at the state department. Ill health is said to have forced Bryan's resignation.

### LIBERAL FALL POSTPONED BY RIOT IN HOUSE

Wild Scenes in Commons Prevent Transaction of Business and Forces Adjournment Until Monday When Home Rule Comes Up Again

Precedent of 300 Years Alleged to Have Been Ignored by Asquith's Refusal to Resign.

LONDON, Nov. 14.—Addressing a conference of the Unionist association here today, Sir William Crump bitterly denounced "a so-called government which ignores a precedent which has stood for 300 years, and refuses to resign in the face of an adverse vote in the commons." After Sir William's speech the association unanimously adopted a resolution offered by Sir Edward Carson condemning the "administration's attempt to force a home rule bill through in defiance of the constitution."

**Howl Down Liberals**  
When the house of commons met as a committee of the whole to consider the trades union bill the conservatives at once began to howl down the Liberals. Order was not restored until the Conservatives became exhausted by their own efforts.

Strong probability of a riot on the floor of parliament, engendered by the high feeling between Conservatives and Liberals in the fight over the home bill, this afternoon prompted Premier Asquith to act on a suggestion from Speaker Lowther and order an adjournment until Monday.

Repetition of yesterday's stormy session came when the house, meeting as a committee of the whole, took up the trade union bill for consideration. This brought howls of derision from the Conservatives, Speaker Lowther being powerless to restore order.

**Churchill's Black Eye**  
Winston Spencer Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, appeared on the floor today with a badly swollen cheek and a discolored eye, the result of having been hit yesterday by a book thrown by Ronald McNeil, a Conservative. McNeil repented his action today and voiced an apology to Churchill from the floor.

In ordering the adjournment, Speaker Lowther said: "No one desires a repetition of yesterday's scenes. I believe more time for consideration may result in finding a solution of the present difficulty more in accord with precedent."

### WANT TEAL IN WILSON CABINET

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 14.—Joseph N. Teal, "secretary of the interior." This is the honor citizens of Portland and the northwest in general would have conferred upon the man who so strongly urged the passage of the Panama free tolls bill. Already a campaign is under way in the shape of many petitions to be presented to President-Elect Wilson, asking him, if he is to remember the west in his cabinet, not to forget Teal. His vast knowledge of reclamation, irrigation, conservation, water and rail transportation and conditions in Alaska amply qualify him for the high position of secretary of the interior, it is contended.
